Rules and Regulations for the Organization of the Republican Party of Nor th Carolina:

We republish below the plan of organization adopted by the Republican State convention in 1880, which will have to be carried out during the present campaign, and the Republicans of the state will do we to study it so as to be able to carry it out. I. County Organization.—The elec-

tion precinct shall be the unit of county organization. Each precinct sit have an executive committee consisting of three active Republicans. They shall be biennially chosen by the Republican voters of the precinct, and shall elect one of their number chairman. They sha convene together at such time and place as the majority of them may elect. They shall biennially elect a county executive committee, to consist of not less than five members, who she elect a chairman from their number. Vacancies in precinct committees sh a be filled by the voters of the precinct, and in county committees by a convention of the precinet committees duly called: Provided, that in case a vacancy occurs within thirty days prior to an election, such vacancy may be filled by the vote of the remaining members.

II. Congressional, Judicial and Senatorial Districts .- There shall be a congressional, Judicial and Senatori a District committee, composed of not less than one member from each county, nor less than seven members, biennia y elected by the several district conventions, each of whom shall elect a chairman from their number: Provided, clous lies which he meant to follow. He that a senatorial district committee shall only be elected in districts embracing more than one county. Vacancies occurring within thirty days of an election may be filled by the vote of the committee.

III. State Executive committee. -There shall be a State Executive committee, composed of one member from each congressional District in the state, to be designated by the district delegations in State convention assembled; two members at large, to be elected by the State convention, and the chairman of the convention at which the election is held. They shall be biennially elected at the State convention, shall choose one of their number chairman, and shall elect a secretary who is not a member, who shall reside at Raleigh.

IV. The chairman of the respective county, district and State Executive committees shall call their conventions to order and act as temporary chairmen until a permanent organization is affected, with power only to appoint, and receive the report of, a committee on credentials.

V. No executive committee shall have power to elect or appoint delegates to any convention, whether county, district, State or National.

VI. No member of an executive committee or delegate or alternate duly DAY, chosen shall have power to delegate his trust or authority to another.

VIL Representation .- Representation in county conventions shall consist of three Republican voters as delegates, and three as alternates, from each precinct in the county, and no

VIII. Representation in congressional, Judicial, Senatorial and State conventions shall consist of two delegates and two alternates only, for every member of the lower House of the General Assembly and shall be apportioned in the several counties accordingly.

IX. Delegates and alternates to county conventions shall be elected only by a vote of the Republicans of each precinct in precinct meeting assembled; and delegates and alternates to district, State and National conventions shall be elected by a convention of delegates duly elected and sent by the people for that purpose after due notice and publication of not less than fifteen days, of the time, place and purpose of such convention, and not other-

XI. This plan of organization and procedure shal continue in force until changed or abrogated by a subsequent Republican State convention. Adopted in State convention, July 8
