> VI. No member of an executive committee or delegate or atternate duly chosen shall have power to delegate his trust or authority to another.

> VII. Representation.-Representation in county conventions shall consist of three Republican voters as delegates, and three as alternates, from each precinct in the county, and no

VIII. Representation in congressional, Judicial, Senatorial and State conventions shall consist of two delegates and two alternates only, for every member of the lower House of the General Assembly and shall be apportioned in the several counties accordance in the seve

ingly. 1X. Delegates and alternates to county conventions shall be elected only by a vote of the Republicans of each precinct in precinct meeting assembled; and delegates and alternates to district, State and National conventions shall be elected by a convention of delegates duly elected and sent by the people for that purpose after due notice and publication of not less than fifteen days, of the time, place and purone of such convention, and not other
