Foreign Exports from the Port of Wilmington for the Month of May.

Below we give a statement of the foreign exports from the port of Wilmington from the month of May, as compiled from the books in the Custom House:

Cotton—1,576 bales, weighing 724,787 pounds, and valued at \$75,197.

Rosin and Turpentine—37,639 barrels, valued at \$60,639.

Tar and Pitch—2,250 barrels, valued at \$4,317.

Spirits Turpentine—202,320 gallons, valued at \$78,706.

Lumber—971,000 feet, valued at \$15,311.

Shingles—75,000, valued at \$579.

Total on American vessels, \$10,632; on foreign vessels, \$218,487. Grand total, \$229,119.

Superior Convened on Monday last, Judge A. A. McKoy presiding. It will be in session next week also.

Sheriff Manning sent deputy sheriff Murray to Raleigh yesterday to carry three convicts to the penitentiary, Eli sha Brown, Robert McDuffie, and Philip Nois.

Parties from Raleigh inform us that the big suit now pending in the circuit court, Virginia Matthews vs. Carolina Central railroad, was argued on Wednesday last.

Rankin Engine House lot, is being enclosed with a new fence, which will be sufficiently high to prevent passers seeing in the cattle pound.

The city fathers have passed an ordinance prohibiting hogs being kept in the city limits. Our friends who have that kind of property had better take notice and act accordingly.

We change the date of publishing the Post, from Sunday to Friday for the benefit of country subscribers. Now we hope our country friends will send in their back dues.

George Z. French informs us that he is carrying quite a nice business in making vegetable and fruit boxes, at his place, and at the same time he is increasing his facilities for the manufacture of time.

Col. S. L. Fremont, City Surveyor, is busy in establishing the grades of some of the principal streets of the city. Mayor Hall intends to work to the line whatever improvements are made in future he says shall be on the proper grade, and all fences shall be erected on the street line.

County Commissioners.

The Board of Commissioners of New Hanover county met in regular session at half past 2 o'clock this afternoon.

Present H. A. Sage, chairman, and commissioners B. G. Worth, Roger Moore, James A. Montgomery and E. L. Pearce.

Minutes of last meeting read and ordered approved. Received a report for the month of May: General fund showing a balance on hand of \$15,991.48. Educational fund showing balance on hand of \$11,229.71.

Register of Deeds submitted his report for the month of May of fees received for marriage licenses, and exhibited the Treasurer's receipt for \$17.10, paid over.

Ordered that a public road be laid out according to law, leading from the landing on Middle Sound, known as Oak Landing, in Page's creek, to some convenient point on a public road leading to the city of Wilmington. Provided, that the owners of the lands over which said road shall pass, will grant the right of way free of all charges to the county. Provided, further, that the parties desiring the opening of said road shall, before the road shall be laid out, pay into the hands of the sheriff of New Hanover county a sum of money sufficient to pay all costs and charges in the premises, including the sheriff's costs, fees for jurors, &c.

Application of C. P. Mebane for remission on the county portion of the tax was ordered granted.

On the petition of W. P. Canaday to be relieved of double tax and penalty, it was ordered that he be relieved of the double tax but not of the penalty.

Board of Aldermen.

The Board met in regular monthly session Monday last at 4 P. M. present, His Honor, Mayor E. D. Hall, and Aldermen DeRosset, Boney, Dudley, Fishblate, Chadbourn, Sweet, Howe and Guyer.

The Committee on Streets and Wharves asked for further time on grading Third street, and on repairing Water street from Dock to Mulberry; and reported progress on opening dock foot of Davis street and the improvement of Parsley street.

Further time was granted the Committee on macadamizing Market street.

The Committee on Fire Department reported, recommending that a suitable house be provided for the Columbia Fire Company as soon as practicable, in accordance with their petition. Adopted.

The Sanitary Committee asked for further time on the resolution in regard to Cart Houses.

The Committee on City Pound reported that the resolution in regard to the same had been carried out.

The Sanitary Committee reported favorably on the petition of certain citizens for a sewer in the alley south of Market and between Front and Water streets. Adopted.

The committee on Markets and Fairs, to whom was referred a petition from a large number of citizens of the Third and Fifth Wards, asking that public markets be established in their respective Wards, reported the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the petitions be granted, the Board of Audit and Finance concurring; and that the committee on Markets and Fairs be authorized to get up estimates as to cost, etc., and report at the next regular meeting of this Board.

The Finance Committee reported that the matter of the claim of George Harris & Co., had been settled.

The committee on the matter of the Ninth Street Engine House asked for further time.

The special committee on the opening of the dock at the foot of Chesnut street reported that they had a joint meeting with the Board of Navigation, and that the said board would not agree to the opening of the said dock, on the ground that in their opinion it would injure the navigation of the river. The committee could not agree with the board, and recommended that the dock be reopened, with the approval of the Board of Audit and Finance; proper safe guards being erected to prevent sand and trash being carried into the dock.

Alderman DeRosset offered the following, which was adopted:

Resolved, That it be referred to the Committee on Ordinances to prepare and report to the next meeting of this Board an ordinance prohibiting the occupation of any portion of the open docks of the city by any flat boat.

Alderman Fishblate moved to amend Article 26, page 9, General Ordinances, to read two dollars instead of three dollars per month, the Board of Audit and Finance concurring.

Alderman DeRosset offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the committee on Finance be empowered to appoint a suitable person to take the tax list of the city, and to record the real estate listed in the Block Book provided for the purpose, under the provisions of the tax ordinance; and with the concurrence of the Board of Audit and Finance, to fix the compensation for the same.

Alderman Fishblate offered an amendment to section 17 of Article 4, page 163, General Ordinances, by striking out all after the word "within" in it. Adopted.

Alderman Chadbourn offered the following, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the Ordinance Committee be empowered to codify the ordinances of the city as soon as possible for publication, including such amendments as they consider desirable.

Alderman Chadbourn offered an ordinance to the effect that any person or persons having to sell beer, cider, wine or spirituous liquors, who shall open his or their shops on Sunday, shall be liable to a fine of twenty dollars, one half to go to the informer, for each and every offence; and any person, except the proprietor or his clerk, seen entering or coming out of said shop, it shall be held prima facie evidence of the offence.

Section 2nd provides that any policeman who shall see any person except the proprietor or his clerk going into or coming out of any bar-room or shop on Sunday and fail to report the same, shall be fined five dollars for the first offence, and be discharged for the second.

Alderman Chadbourn offered the following, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the City Tax Collector be required at every regular meeting to read the list of all license taxpayers one month or more in arrears; and this shall be considered as unfinished business. The Tax Collector shall also be required to show cause in each case of such delinquency, why the ordinance in regard to license taxes has not been enforced.

The petition of citizens, for the improvement of Nixon street, was referred to the committee on Streets and Wharves.

The report of the committee on Rates of Wharfage was approved and ordered printed for distribution.

Ordered that a gas lamp be placed on the corner of Front street and Pot's alley.

The Board went into an election of a Board of Navigation and Pilotage, with the following result: J. H. Chadbourn, Don McRae, James Sprunt, D. G. Worth, R. E. Heide.

Alderman Fishblate moved that the office of Standard Keeper be declared vacant. Motion lost.

Alderman Fishblate moved that the Board of Audit and Finance be requested not to purchase weights and measures.

Alderman Dudley moved to lay the motion on the table. Lost.

The motion of Alderman Fishblate was put and lost.

Alderman Guyer moved that the Market be kept open from sunrise to sunset. Referred to the committee on Markets and Fairs.

The Board then adjourned.

Quarantine Notice.

QUARANTINE FOR THE PORT OF WILMINGTON will be enforced from May 1st to November 1st as follows:

Ships will bring all vessels from ports South of Cape Fear to the Quarantine anchorage; also, all vessels which have had any kind of sickness on board during the voyage, or on arrival, and will cause a signal to be set in the main rigging on the port side, as soon as possible after crossing the Bar.

No vessel must leave the Quarantine anchorage, or allow any person, steamer, tug boat, lighter, or boat of any kind to go alongside, unless by written authority from the Quarantine Physician, and every vessel must be anchored as far to the eastward of the channel as is consistent with safety.

Regulations govern all vessels while in Quarantine may be had on application at the office of the Quarantine Physician at Smithville.

Applications for permits to visit vessels in Quarantine must be made to Dr. Thomas P. Wood or Dr. Geo. W. Thomas, and permits so obtained will be endorsed by the Quarantine Physician, if in his opinion, it is proper and safe to allow communication with such vessels.

A penalty of \$200 for each and every offence will be collected against any person violating any of the Quarantine regulations of the Port. W. G. CURTIS, M. D., Quarantine Physician, Port of Wilmington.
