CAROLINA.

Durham is to have three simultaneous births in December. An effort is being made to reorganize the old Edgecombe Guards. There is a successful revival in the Methodist Church at Hillsboro. Sheriff Williams, of Henderson, paid into the State Treasury Monday the sum of \$2,869. Mr. Wm. H. Jones, an old and prominent citizen of Newbern, died in that city last Sunday night. Raleigh paid off its city officials on Tuesday in the amount due them for August. Two months wages are yet due. The Charlotte Observer records the death of Rev. A. W. Miller, D. D., pastor of the First Presbyterian Church in that city, of consumption. Wayne county sent up on Tuesday night five convicts to the Penitentiary, one of whom was formerly a boss policeman at Goldsboro. Governor Holden is expected to issue a proclamation, in a day or two, appointing Thursday, November 25th, as a day of Thanksgiving. Capt. H. M. Dixon, formerly of Company H., 55th N. C. Regiment, is organizing a company of 100 men to attend the Centennial next year. Since September 1, 15,722 bales of cotton have been received in the Raleigh market. This is an increase of 4,750 bales over the same time last year. John R. Good, col. of Newbern, has been appointed one of the Directors of the Insane Asylum, by Gov. Holden, vice G. W. Brodie absent from the State. At the recent annual meeting of the stockholders of the Atlanta and Richmond Air-Line Company, held in Atlanta, Col. A. S. Buford was re-elected President, and Messrs. E. Clayton, B. Y. McAden and J. H. Wilson, of North Carolina, were placed on the Board of Directors. The Raleigh News says: We learn that a fire occurred yesterday at the paper mills of the Neuse Manufacturing Company, some twelve miles from this city, a house used for lodgings for the drivers and other operatives, taking fire accidentally and being totally destroyed. All the contents saved. The Weldon News says: The gin house and several bales of cotton of Mrs. Kitchin, of Scotland Neck, mother of Capt. W. H. Kitchin, was burned on Thursday night last. The incendiary, a negro, was caught, but made his escape. Mr. W. H. Shields tells us that he can count up 25 gin-houses burned since the war in the lower portion of this county and Martin.

THE GALLANT GREY.

Parade of the Military Companies and a Brave Show—Maj. Devane's Address and Col. Lamb's Reply. The sun rose this morning in an unclouded sky and the balmy November air brought the flush of hope and expectation into the faces of those who were to take part in to-day's parade, as well as those who were desirous of witnessing it. It was a lovely day for the purpose, and it was especially welcome coming as it did, after the severe rains of yesterday. About 10 o'clock the line was formed on Princess street with Col. Roger Moore and his Assistant Marshals in the van, the right of the line being assigned to the Cape Fear Light Artillery and the left to the Norfolk City Guards, with the Cornet Concert Club and the Drum Corps in front, the Wilmington Light Infantry and the Raleigh Light Infantry being aligned, respectively, as right and left centre companies, the Norfolk City Guards carrying their own band at their front. The rear of the procession was brought up by Col. William Lamb, Commandant at Fort Fisher, Maj. D. J. Devane and Col. John W. Atkinson in a carriage, followed on foot by the Survivors of Fort Fisher and other of the brave defenders of the Cape Fear river and coast.

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
