THE OLD WORLD'S NEWS AND WAR NOTES.

Washington News.

CONGRESSIONAL.

LONDON, August 1.—The Standard this morning has a special dispatch from Widin, which says that Hatiz Pasha entered Servia on the 29th of July. At Gramado he encountered 4,000 Servians. After a four hours' fight the Servians fled, leaving many killed. Hatiz Pasha joined Ahmed Eyoob Pasha at Derbent on the 20th, where he again attacked the Servians. A great battle occurred, which raged all day. The result is not known. The Turks, under Sackman Pasha, entered Servia, near Pandirala, where they encountered eight Servian battalions, with twelve guns. After a sharp battle the Servians fled, throwing away their guns. The Turks continue their advance. Sixty Russian officers are expected at Nissia to enter the Servian army.

A dispatch to Reuter's telegram company from Scutari says a rumor is current that the Turks after routing a Servian detachment at Pandirala, have moved on Kajazewatz. If this is confirmed, Scutari and the Servian position on the Timah river are seriously threatened. Three regiments of Egyptian infantry, one cavalry regiment and two batteries of artillery have started for Mitrovitza. A special dispatch to the Times, as well as dispatches to other journals say that Osman Pasha, who was captured at Uziza, is not identical with the Osman Pasha who commands the Turkish troops against the Servians. Out of sixteen Turkish battalions who were engaged at Uziza four only reached Bilek. The battalions probably average under 400 men each.

A correspondent of the Times telegraphs from Ragusa, saying: "I have perfectly trustworthy information that the Turks in the engagement on Friday near Metine numbered 12,000. They were driven to Podgoritza, lost two guns, and their supporting battalions were completely annihilated.

Recently the Servians fired upon a passing Austrian steamer in the Danube, for which Austria immediately demanded satisfaction. An investigation followed, and to-day advices are received stating that the commander of the Servians who were guilty of the outrage has been dismissed from the service.

The Times Berlin dispatch says it is stated from Servian sources that the Russian General Von Kaufman, well known as the conqueror of Khiva, is going to the Servian camp. Ex-Marshal Bazaine, of the French army, directs the Turks at Suenitza.

The Standard's Vienna dispatch says the abdication of the Sultan is imminent. It is expected that Abd ul Hamid will be proclaimed to-day.

The Standard's Constantinople telegram says the issue of paper money is to begin immediately. The measure is regarded with dismay.

In the House of Commons this evening Disraeli, in answer to a question, stated that discussion on extradition was impossible this week, owing to pressure of business, but the prorogation would not take place without its being brought forward.

PARIS, August 1.—M. Casser's motion in the Chamber of Deputies looking to the enforcement of the law of 1878 for expelling Jesuits from the country, has been abandoned.

WASHINGTON, August 1.—The Indiana Republicans in Washington are exceedingly anxious about the result in that State in October next. A meeting was held at the Ebbitt House last night, at which it was agreed that the good of the party required the withdrawal of Godlove S. Orth from the ticket as the nominee for Governor. Orth, it is said, is ready to be martyred, and will submit to decapitation whenever the State committee is ready to proceed with this solemn duty. The Venezuelan claims commission swindle is more than the good of the party can stand in the approaching campaign.

SENATE.—The Chair laid before the Senate a message from the President concerning the Haynir affair, which was ordered to be printed.

The Chair appointed Messrs. West and Cockrell commissioners on the part of the Senate to consider the reorganization of the army.

Impeachment was resumed. Belknap was not present, but was represented by Mr. Carpenter.

The vote stood 25 for conviction to 25 for acquittal.

As each vote on each article was announced, the presiding officer, Mr. Ferry, stated that two-thirds of the Senate not having voted to sustain the article, the respondent was acquitted on that charge. After the announcement of the last vote he directed that a judgment of acquittal be entered, in accordance with the 22nd rule for the government of impeachment trials. The impeachment Court then adjourned sine die.

Adjourned.

House.—The Coining Silver bill was filibustered over the morning hour.

Mr. Glover, of the Real Estate Pool, made a report, with a resolution, referring the evidence against Secretary Robeson to the Judiciary committee, with power to take additional evidence. The majority report was signed by Glover, Lewis and Culbertson, and was adopted.

The Election committee reported in five

contests, declaring the sitting members, Hyman of North Carolina, Candler of Georgia, Lynch of Mississippi, Norton of New York, Freeman of Pennsylvania, duly elected and entitled to their seats. The report was adopted.

A resolution from the District committee, directing the Clerk to certify to the Attorney General and Grand Jury evidence against members of the District Ring, with a view to criminal prosecution, was adopted.

Enquiries upon the late Jas. T. Parsons, of Kentucky, were pronounced by Messrs. Boone and Jones, of Kentucky, and Lawrence, of Ohio.

Adjourned.

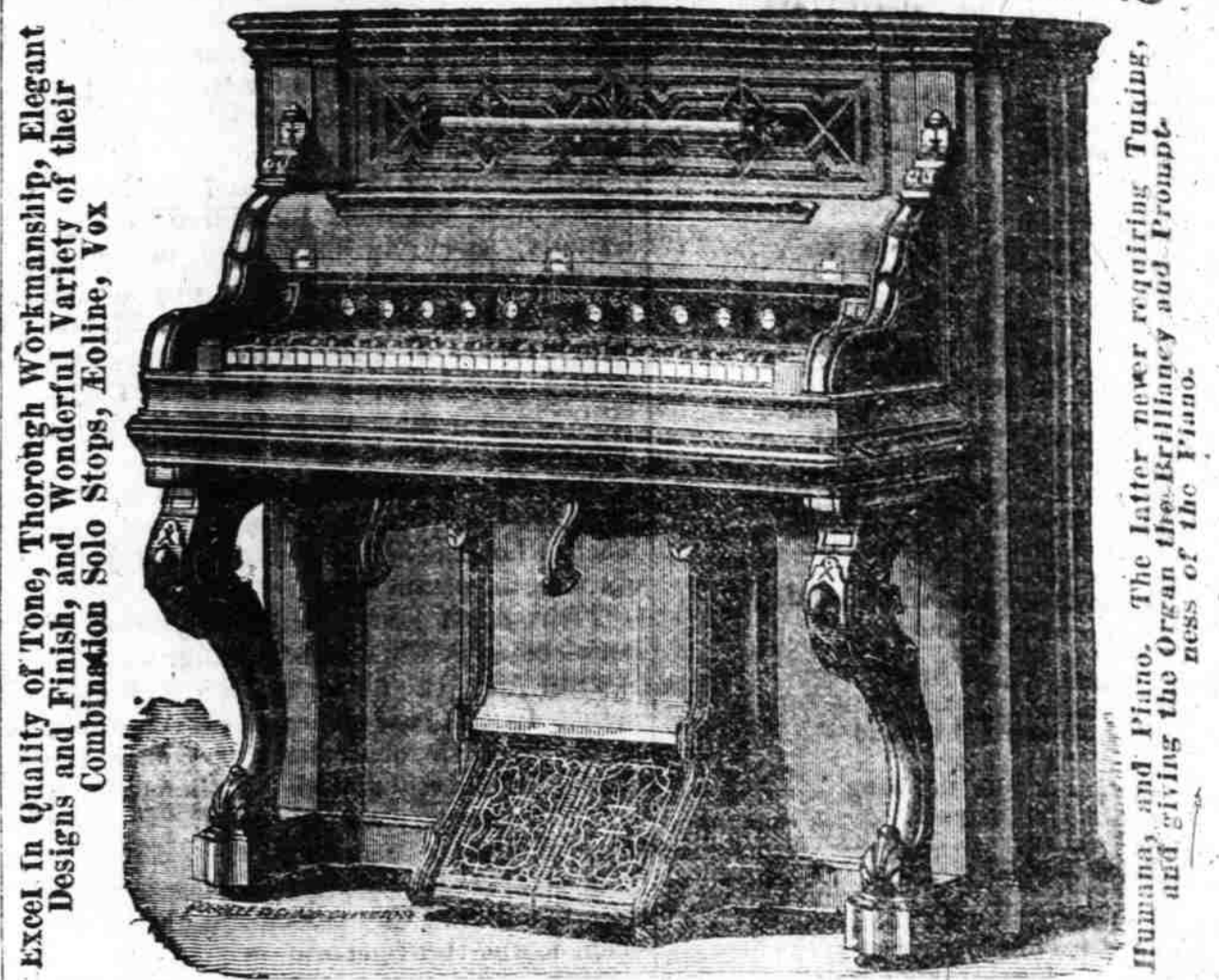
