THE NEWS AND THE CITIZENS' MEET-With the news which comes to us from Sherman and Sheridan-with the news that continues to come forms of union successes in all parts of , the country,-it seems to us there should be no trouble in determining the best interests of this city and State at the citizens meeting to-morrow night. It was said that Wilmington and Charleston were both evacuated in order to concentrate troops to oppose Sherman. In addition to the troops withdrawn from those points, reinforcemon's were sent to Johnston's army from Richmond, and even the old chieftnin, Lee himself, went down to step the advance of the Yankee army. But it was all to no purpose. Sherman moved on as steadily as though no opposition ware in his way, and despite rebel prophesies of his utter destruction, he has struck a new bas , and is to day perfectly secure. The time when he could have been destroyed, had the rebels the power to destroy him, is past . The golden opportunity has flows. S eridan has pounced down upon Early like an eagle upon its prey, and swooped up the reliel army of the Valley of Virginia, horse, foot and dragoons, bag and baggage, commander and subalterne. A more complete affair has not been recorded during the war. And now Lee is compelled to send away from Richmond another detachment -a strong force-to guard his lack door at Lynchburg. He will be wise to look out how he sends troops away, or Grant will pounce down upon him some fine morning, and serve him quite as unceremoniously as did Sheridan Early. The principal towns of North Carolina are one after the other falling into the possession of the mational forces. Beaufort, Newbern, Wilmington, Faycuteville. Kinston-these already float the stars and stripes. The same emblem will fly over Gol isboro and Raleigh and Hillsboro and Greensboro doubtless before many days. For, if Sherman could not be stopped when marching from Savannah' into the State, he certainly caunot be resisted now that to his victorious army is added the powerful force under the command of General Scho eld. We can tell the doubtful ones, if any such there be, that there are national troops enough in North Carolina to-day to conquor the united armies of the rebellion.

army that is so highly spoken of, and pleasure that we are made a mouth-piece for the lodies. And this leads to the suggestion, where are the ladies ? One is heard from; none are seen. The federal soldiers are harmless to ladies, well-behaved and polite. The presence of the fair sex on the streets occasionally would only tend to illustrate more clearly there good qualities. It would do more. The boys are weary with long and arduous campaigning, and careless of their appearance because of the utter absence from female society to which they have so long been subjected. Should tney encounter smiling beauty at every corner, how quickly their appearance would change. Cloth and shoe brushes would be in so great demand that Cutter & French would be compelled to send for an extra cargo at once. Then, too, there would seem to be a greater object in cleaning up the streets, and so the sanitary condition of the town would be improved. In every view of the case good would come of it, Even Mayor Dawson's grand meeting of citizens would have greater significance were the ladies to come out and man fest by their smiles a union sentiment. By all means, ladies, show yourselves there bright sun-shiny days, and withhold us from running back into absolute barbarism.

CLEANLINESS AND HEALTH.

We are daily in receipt of communications from citizens in regard to the danger incurred by reason of the filthy condition of the streets and alleys of the town, and are pleased to notice that the military authorities have taken the matter in hand, and with strong details of men are at work removing the accumulations of offal that disfigure the highways. No more important work than this can be undertaken; and it will not be completed when the present accumulations are removed. It is a work that, in this climate, requires to be renewed every day. The refuse of restaurants, cook-houses and kitchens should not be permitted to be thrown into the streets, but deposited in boxes or barrels, and hauled away b/ garbage carts every morning. The trenches that surround the city, if not positively necessary for military purposes, of which we do not judge, should be filled up to prevent their use by the soldiers, and proper places of retirement with deep sinks should be prepared wherever they will be most convenient. There are other suggestions of a sonitary nature that have been made, . but the author ties will doubtless not require their repetition. Those who have resided in Wilmington longest, and are most familiar with its climate, are really working themselves into a panic on this subject. There is every general alarm lest a few days of warm weather, which we are likely to have at any time now, should produce a pestilence in our midst. But there is no occasion for this alarm or panic. As we have said, the work is already commenced, and in a very short time the city will be as clean as a next housewife's kitchen. The labor of keeping it clean will then be comparatively easy.

TREASURY REGULATIONS. SEATE SASCIAL TREASURY AGENCY,) Wilmington, N. C., March 10th, 1865.

The following temporary rules are announced for the information of all parties interested at Wilmington and vicinity :

1. Permits to keep "Supply Stores" at Wilming ton, and other places within this Agency, will be is-sued only to persons of unquestionable loyalty, and over to a Committee to be composed of the who fully comply with the general Treasury Regulations by taking the required oath and filing the the proper bonds. A prication to keep "Supply Stores" mu-toe ma e to the Supervising Special Agent, or to an Assistant Agen .

11. All parties who sell goods, wares, and mer chandise without obtaining a proper authority, will be liable to ave their entire stock in trade seized,

condemned as d sold, as provided by law. [11] No person shall be interested in more than one Supply Store in this Agency, and the name and location of every party so interested, must be given to the Supervi-ing or Assistant Special Agent, before the authority or permit is issued. The Eaxi mum amount that any firm may be permitted to import for sale, shall not exceed \$3000.00 per month unless the Commanding General of the District for military reasons' requests it to be larger. Regular authorized parties keeping Supply Stores, may sell to other aut orized Supply Stores for resales the Supply Store making the purchas, in no instance, however, to go beyond the amount, per month, designated in their authority.

IV. Every person connected with a Supply Store as clerk or assistant, and not a member of the firm, will be required to take the oath of loyalty, and file the same with the Supervising, the Assistant, or one of the Local Special Agents.

V. Any act or expression of disloyalty or mativest indications of sympathy and favor for the success of the present rebellion, will be regarded as sufficients cause for the immediate cancellation of the authority. This is intende ; to app y to all members of the firm as well as clerks and assi tants.

VI. The books and accounts of all Supply Storis will be subject to examination by the Supervising or Assistant Special Agent, or by the proper Local Sp cial Agent.

VII. Merchants and traders will be permitted to sell goods and supplies in recsonable quantities to loval porties, who reside within the pocket lines of this Military Post, without the certificate of the Local Special Agent. No trader or merchant, however, will be allowed to sell to any party permitted by the Militars authorities ro come from eyond aid picket lines, unless the persit of said Local Special Agent is exhibited to said trader or merchant and then bo greater quantity coust be sold than specified by said permit. All puties coming through said vicket lines before making purchases are directed to the office of the Local Special Agent. Permits to come and so through the picket lines are given entirely by the Military authout es.

VIII. No met count or tra 'er will be permitted to purchase or take possession of the goods and stock in trade of another Supply Store, without giving duo notice and obtaining permission from this office. 1X. The bringing of fresh vegetables, truits, but-

So long as the blockade continues here, good and supplies can only be brought directly 'd Wi mington via Cape Fear River as a military necessity. The applicant must obtain the consent o' the War Department at Washington before the Treasury Department can permit grouds to be shipped direct y to this place, as alore, vid. . On the arrival of goods at this point s permitted, they nust be first reported to the Local Agent and th -n sold onis in accordance with the Treasury Regulation . The Local Agent will examine the cargo to'ascertain whether it compares with the duplicate invoices.

XII. All parties holding or controlling personal property within our lines, including cotton, tobacco, and other productions consigned, deposited or left with them by any person or persons within the Re bel lines, or known to be identified with the rebellion will be expected to account for and promptly deliver up the same to be dispused of as captured or abandoned property. Leases given for abandon-d houses, store rooms, and tenements by such parties within the Rebel lines can have no force or validity. The rent for property of this discription (not occupied by the military authorities) must be paid to the Treasury Agent. Parties holding houses and furuiture belonging to persons within the Rebel lines will be expected to give a strict account of the same, in order that such disposition may be made of the same as provided by law and the Regulations.

XIII. The puschase and shipment of products by private parties is, and will be, suspended until full and specific instructions are received from th - Treasurv Departmont.
