Chief Quartermaster - Brigadier General George F. Dodge, Office, Cape Fear Bank building, on Front Street, near Market.

Deputy Quartermaster - Captain Samuel T. Lamb, A. Q. M. in charge of Water Transportation, etc., Office Water Street, between Market and Dock.

Captain Andrew Alsworth, Captain of the Port, Charged with the regulation of all vessels in the harbor, and arriving or departing, furnishing pilot, lightering, towing, etc. Office Custom House building, on the wharf, above Market Street.

GENERAL ORDERS, No. 1.

GENERAL ORDERS, No. 3.

All military officers in the service of the United States, arriving at this Post on leave or absent from their commands, will report immediately at the office of the Post Commandant and register their names.

The commanders of all vessels, not naval, arriving at this Port, will on arriving immediately report to these Headquarters and furnish a list of all passengers who are civilians, and information showing by what authority they are here, and their business.

GENERAL ORDERS, No. 18.

Brig. General J. B. Hawley is hereby assigned to the command of the District of Wilmington which will embrace all the territory under military control in rear of the army operating from Cape Fear River as a base.

Gen. Hawley will be responsible for the protection of the depot at Wilmington, Cape Fear Harbor and the line of rail road in rear of the army. He will also perform the duties of Provost Marshal General for the District under his command.

Who will receive and issue the supplies to the poor. The Quartermaster, Department will furnish the necessary transportation.

Headquarters 1st Div. of Wm. Army, Wilmington, N. C., March 1st, 1865.

General Order No. 3 - All persons in this District are hereby enjoined to bring in and deliver to Capt. A. Obermayer, at the office of Brigadier General Hayes, next door to District Headquarters, all rifles and muskets and their appendances, swords, pistols and military weapons and equipments that were formerly held by the late rebel forces.

It is known that a large quantity of small arms of various descriptions were left in the hands of persons about the time the town was occupied by the lawful authorities. All such must be promptly turned in, or the parties holding them will be immediately dealt with.
