CAROLINA BELLE SNUFF.

AN ACT TO INCREASE THE EFFICIENCY

OF THE HOME GUARD ORGANIZATION.

SEC. 1. Built enacted by the General Assembly of the St. te of North Carolina, and it is hereby enacted by the Guard for authority of the same, That whenever the Guard for home Defence shall be called into service beyond the same and no service beyond the same are the pardon now offered or who shall hereafter desert or absent themselves without leave, shall suffer such punishment as the Courts may impose, and no application for elemency will be entertained.

SEC. 2. Be it further enacted, That the Governor may in like manner cause two or more battalions or regiments of the home Guards when called into service beyond their respective battalion or regimental limits, or when called into service within such limits, in connection with other portions of such force, to be consolidated, said batalions when so consolidated to be composed of not less than three companies, and said regiments when so consolidated to be composed of not more than ten compa. nies. The Governor may assign to the command of such consolidated battalion or regiment any officer or officers from the battalion or regiment so consolidated.

SEC. 3. Be it further enacted, That the Governor may in his discret on, in constituting the consolidated companies contemplated by the first section thereof, take the one-fourth, one-third, or one-half of any company as at present organized with a due proportion of its officers, out of which to constitute such consolidated company, and such of the officers of companies as at present organized, as may be placed with fractions of their companies, to form a consolidated company-as may not be elected to command such consolidated company, shall be required to serve in such consolidated company as noncommissioned officers of privates, and while so serving their commissions shall be suspended. The Governor shall have power to discriminate in favor of farmers and mech nics, when he calls out a less number than the whole of a company, also to declare vacant the office of an officer who is declared by a medical board permanently dis bled for fie'd duty, either in the militia or Home Guards, or of an officer who absconds to the enemy.

SEC. 4, Be it further enacted, That all Quartermasters and Commissaries of regiments or battalions of Home Guards as at present organized, that may not be assigned to duty by the Governor with a consolidated battalion or regiment, shall be required to serve as non-commissioned officers or privates, in some one company of their present commard, and while so serving their commissions shall be suspended,

SEC. 5. Be it further enacted That the Surgeon General, by and with the advice and consent of the Governor, shall appoint a Medical Board for each Gorgressional District in this State, whose business it shall be to examine all persons claiming exemption from Home Guard duty on account of physical dist hay, that these examinations shall be made at such time and under such rules and regulations as may be establ. hed by the Surgeon General, and that the members et soid Board shall receive the same pay and allowances while on cuty as the Confederate Conscript Boards.

Sec. 6. Be it further enacted, That wi en such companies, battanons' or regiments have been consolidated as herein provided for, they shall continu in such organizations until further provisions shall by made in their be-

Sec. 7. Le it further enacted, That tir second section of "an act in relation to the militia an ta Guard for Home Defence," ratified the 7th day of July, 1268, be, and the same is hereby amonded, by striking out il e word "these" in the ninth line of said section, and inserting the word "the;" that the third section of "an act ! . am and an act in relation to the militia and Guard for II me Defence," ratified the 14th day of December, 186 t, I e and the same is hereby amenced, by inserting between the words "millers" and "black-miths" the word "a' d;" and that the proviso at the end of said 3d section be and the same is hereby repealed. That in addition to the exemptions specified in the acta aloresaid, there shall I exempt from Home Guard duty all county trustees, regul r and public tanuers, batters and shoemakers skilled in the in respective callings, and who were employed in the sa is prior to the first day of Jan ary, A. D., 1883, and hav a or tinued to be employed since that time.

Sec. 8. Be it further enacted, That this act il a l'be in ferce from and after its ratification.

HDQ'RS ARMIES OF THE C. STATES,) 11th February, 1865. GENERAL ORDERS,

No. 2. In entering upon the campaign about to open, the General-in-hief feels assured that the soldiers who have

so long and so nobly borne the hardships and dangers of the war, require no exhortation to respond to the calls of honor and duty. With the liberty transmitted by their forefathers, they

have inherited the spirit to defend it. The choice between war and abject submission is be-

To such a proposal, brave men with arms in their hands can have but one answer. They cannot barter manhood for peace, nor the right

of self-government for life or property. But justice to them requires a sterner admonition to those who have abandoned their comrades in the hour of

A last opportunity is offered them to wipe out the disgrace and escape the punishment of their crimes. By authority of the President of the Confederate States, a pardon is announced to such deserters and men improperly absent as shall return to the commands to which they belong within the shortest possible time, not exceeding twenty days from the publication of this order,

at the headquarters of the department in which they may

Those who may be prevented by interruption of communications, may report within the time specified to the nearest enrolling officer or other officer on duty, to be forwarded as soon as practicable, and upon presenting a cert ficate from such officer showing compliance with this requirement, will receive the pardon hereby offered.

Those who have deserted to the service of the enemy, or who have deserted after having been once pardoned for the same offence, and those wao shall desert, or absent themselves without authority after the publication of this order, are excluded from its benefits. Nor does the offer of pardon extend to other offences than desertion and absence without permission.

By the same authority, it is also declared that no general amnesty will again be granted, and those who

The discipline and efficiency of the army have been greatly impaired by men leaving their proper com-mands to join others, in which they find service more agreeable.

This practice, almost as it jurious in its consequences es the crime of desertion, by the Articles of War, exposes the offender to a similar punishment, and subjects the officer receiving him to dismissal from the army.

It is therefore declared that the provisions of General Order, No. 2, of this date, from army headquarters, apply to such men as have left their proper commands and joined others without being regularly transferred. They will receive the pardon promised in that order, upon complying with its conditions, or suffer the consequences attached to neglecting it.

The names of such absenters will be forthwith reported to these headquarters by the officers with whom they are serving, and immediate measures taken to return them to their proper commands.

As soon as practicable, an inspection will be made, and charges will be preferred against those who neglert to enforce this order. R. E. LEE, General. March 1-6t.

Eurolling Officers will make every effort to give publicity to this important order, and will arge all good citizens of their respective counties to aid them in rendering its design successful.

It will be observed that this is the last offer of pardon for the infamous crime of desertion that will be mada; Enrolling Officers are made responsible, under a penalty of trial by Court Martial, that every possble effort is made to apprehend all such as do not report themselves. Earothing Officers will allow such as vo'untarily report within the specified time to go direct to their commands furnishing them transportation and the necessary certifi-

A duplicate of every certificate thus given will be forwarded to this office.
