IMPORTANT ARREST. A man who gives the name of Andrew Mercer was arrested here yesterday under the following circumstances:

He arrived at Goldsboro' on the Wilmington train, night before last, where he created suspicion. He left immediately on foot in the direction of Newbern; and on the departure, yesterday morning, of the Newbern train from Goldsboro', parties were put upon the alert to see if Mercer would take the train by the way.

Mercer did get on the train, but on hearing Newbern he was observed to jump off. Information was at once given to the police here, when the train stopped, and one or two of the force started in pursuit, but failed to come up with him. He was subsequently arrested and is now in the city jail.

Another robbery. Yesterday, between breakfast and dinner hours, the residence of Mr. John Pearce, on George street, near the Soldier's Burying Ground, was entered by thieves and robbed of about five hundred dollars worth of clothing, a gold watch, ten or twelve dollars in specie and a revolver, and perhaps other property.
