She was a highly accomplished and exemplary lady, and beloved by all who knew her. Her loss will be bitterly felt by all her relatives and acquaintances.

LOSS OF BUTTER.—The Store of Samuel Blagge & Co., was entered and dispossessed of two tubs of Butter on Sunday night. The thieves were not apprehended.

THE SENSATION OF THE DAY.—The bar-keepers of this city were startled, on Tuesday morning, by a bomb-shell thrown into their camp in the shape of Gen. Sickles' order No. 33, which first appeared in the columns of our last issue. The excitement was intense, and all persons engaged in the business were on the alert, gathered in groups and squads on the streets, discussing the alarming topic. It was amusing to listen to the ways and means suggested for evading the order.

However, no matter what may be the feeling in regard to it, the order is imperative, and its provisions must be complied with.

Meeting of the City Council.

TUESDAY, June 4th. Major Wm. L. Palmer having duly qualified as Mayor of the City of New Bern, took his seat and read the following order:

"Subject to the order of the Commanding General 2nd Military District, the appointment of Wm. L. Palmer as Mayor for the City of New Bern, N. C., is hereby announced to take effect immediately upon subscribing to the oath as set forth in General Orders No. 33, War Department, A. G. O., Washington, March 28th, 1867.

(Signed) Major J. J. VAN HORN, Commanding Post of New Bern.

He remarked that the position of Mayor was something new to him, but that he should discharge the duties of the office to the best of his ability in the reduction of taxes and checking crime.

Mr. E. R. Stanly having qualified, presented his certificate of appointment as a member of the Council, and took his seat.

Mr. E. R. Hubbs, late acting Mayor, read an order he had received from Major General Sickles in regard to the Sanitary condition of the City.

It was moved by Mr. Stanly, that a Committee be appointed to wait on Major J. J. Van Horn, Commandant of the Post of New Bern, and confer with him in regard to order No. 55, issued May 27th.

Dr. Menninger offered the following amendment to Mr. Stanly's motion.

That the Sanitary Committee conferred with Major Van Horn, instead of conferring, which was adopted.

Mr. Hubbs presented the following report from Newbern Steam Fire Engine Company, No. 1.

"We report having made a report to the last meeting of the Board of Council, in which we stated there was a mistake in the last Treasurer's statement of the amount of the bills allowed by the last Board on account of the Fire Department. We find our report entirely

incorrect. It was made up without reference to any source from which a correct report might be made. We have since examined the report as made by the Treasurer, comparing the items and find his statement to be correct. (Signed) CHARLES HIBBARD, C. W. GUNN, A. R. DENNISON.

Mr. Hubbs also read communications, which he had received from Generals Sickles and Miles, and Gov. Worth, in regard to appropriations for the destitute poor, which, on motion, was placed on file.

Dr. Menninger offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the Mayor be requested to appoint the following Standing Committees, to perform the various duties which may pertain to their respective departments during the term of office: Board of Health; Committee on Finance; on Sanitary Affairs; on Street Pumps and Cemeteries; on Fire Department and Public Lights; on Police and Markets; on Ordinances and Licenses; on Charities.

A petition was read from Woolcott & Tinker, in regard to the fish stands at the market, and, on motion of Mr. Hubbs, they were allowed to remain three weeks longer.

Applications were received from the following parties for licenses to keep hotels, viz: J. W. Vaughn, John O'Connor, J. W. Dey, M. J. McNamara, E. Whitman, Schillinger & Riedle, John O. Gardner.

Dr. Menninger said that the Board had no power to grant such licenses, as he did not consider General Sickles' late order in force, and that the Council having received no official notice of the order, could not act upon it until a copy had been served upon them by the Post Commander.

His Honor, the Mayor stated that he had been requested by Major Van Horn, to put that order in force.

Dr. Menninger offered the following resolution:

Resolved, "That inasmuch as no official information has been received by this Board, of General Order No. 32, from Headquarters, Military District, published in the public prints, the application for Licenses to keep Hotels and Inns under the provisions of that order be referred to the Committee on Ordinances and Licenses for investigation and report."

Which Resolution was unanimously adopted. On motion of Dr. Menninger, the Board proceeded to the election of a permanent Treasurer, resulting in the choice of Mr. E. R. Stanly.

A debate ensued on financial matters, and several bills were presented and allowed. After which the Board adjourned until next Monday at 4 o'clock, P. M.

Special Meeting of the City Council.

WEDNESDAY, June 6th, 4 P. M. Present, His Honor Mayor Palmer, Councilmen Stanly, Jacobs, Foster, Hubbs and Menninger.

Mayor Palmer notified the Board that he had received from the Post Commander, an official copy of General Sickles' Order No. 32, relating to the licensing of liquor Saloons and bar rooms, &c., &c.

He then announced the following regular Committees of the Board:

On Charities—Councilmen Foster, Seymour and Jacobs.

Fire Department and Public Lights—Seymour, Jacobs and Radcliff.

Police and Markets—Jacobs, Radcliff and Hubbs.

Streets, Pumps and Cemeteries—Radcliff, Hubbs and Stanly.

Ordinances and Licenses—Hubbs, Stanly and Menninger.

Finance—Stanly, Menninger and Foster.

Sanitary Affairs—Menninger, Foster and Seymour.

The following ordinance prepared by Councilman Menninger was read and passed, and ordered to be published and distributed forthwith:

ORDINANCE FOR SANITARY PURPOSES.

1. It is ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of New Bern, That the occupants of each and every lot in the city (and in case the lot is unoccupied the owner thereof) are hereby ordered to collect and deposit in barrels, or other suitable receptacles, all refuse description, such as garbage, ashes and filth of every description, that may accumulate on their respective lots, dwelling places, or business stands, and to place such barrels or other receptacles on the sidewalks in front of their respective lots, on Monday and Thursday mornings of each week, before the hour of 8 o'clock.

2. It is further ordained, That all decayed animal or vegetable matter, offal, garbage or sweepings of any kind, collecting in or around the stalls of any public or private market, shall be deposited by the occupants of said stalls in fit and proper receptacles, and removed before the hour 2 o'clock p. m. of each day.

3. It is further ordained, That all persons are prohibited from throwing any offal, rubbish, garbage, sweepings or refuse of any kind whatever, into any of the slips or docks around the city, or upon the walks, city limits.

4. It is further ordained, That hereafter no sinks or privies shall be dug or excavated for more than two feet from the surface of the surrounding ground.

5. It is further ordained, That each and every property owner within the City limits shall maintain his water-closets or privies which may be upon his property, cleaned out or disinfected by the use of coppers, whenever such cleaning or disinfecting may become necessary, or whenever notice to that effect may be served upon such property owner by the Sanitary Committee of the Board of Council.

6. It is further ordained, That no person shall feed, water, wash or clean any animal within fifteen feet of any of the public pumps of this City.

7. It is further ordained, That all persons are prohibited from throwing anything into any of the public pumps, wells or reservoirs of the City, or impair their utility in any manner.

8. It is further ordained, That no person shall convey to, sell or offer for sale any damaged or spoiled meat, fish, corn, wheat, rye, oats, peas or other articles of food within the jurisdiction of the City authorities.

9. It is further ordained, That no cattle or swine shall be slaughtered within the City limits.

10. It is further ordained, That all persons are prohibited from keeping any live hogs within the City limits from the 1st day of May to the 31st day of October.

11. It is further ordained, That no grave shall be dug in any of the Cemeteries in and around the City, unless it be at least five feet deep.

12. It is further ordained, That no corpse shall be removed from the Cemeteries, in and around the City, without special permit from the Sanitary Committee of the City Council.

13. It is further ordained, That any person violating any of the foregoing ordinances shall, upon conviction before the Mayor, be fined a sum not exceeding fifty dollars for each and every offence, and if any person shall fail to

pay such fine he shall be ordered to work upon the public streets a sufficient length of time to compensate for the amount of such fine in accordance with the law of the State for such cases provided.

14. It is further ordained, That all previous Ordinances and conflicting herewith, are hereby repealed. Messrs. Woolcott & Tinker and Ball sent in applications for licenses to keep Inns—the Board adjourned.

Editor of the New Bern Republican:

Sir—There are some persons so old-timish as to think that it might have been an act of ordinary courtesy to have stated the reasons why Major Palmer is appointed Mayor of this city, in place of the individual originally appointed by Gen. Sickles, instead of the current announcement in this morning's issue of your paper—particularly, as you were perfectly familiar with all the facts of the case.

I deem it due to my friends at least, that this should be done. I ask you therefore, to publish in your next issue, the following copy of my note to Major Van Horn, as fully explaining my position in connection with that position. Very respectfully, JNO. N. WASHINGTON.

NEW BERN, N. C., May 31st, 1867.

Sir:—Upon a careful consideration of the oath which Maj. Gen. Sickles thinks necessary to be taken by those who hold office under the present provisional government of North Carolina, I think it is at least doubtful whether I can conscientiously take it.

In a matter of so delicate a nature, a doubt with me is conclusive. Tending you, therefore, my sincere thanks for the compliment of a re-nomination, I beg leave respectfully to decline the office.

Important Order from Major General Sickles.

We have just received, for publication, the following important order of General Sickles, from Major J. J. Van Horn, Commandant of this post.

HEADQUARTERS SECOND MILITARY DISTRICT, CHARLESTON, S. C., May 30, 1867. GENERAL ORDERS, No. 32.

I. Any citizen, a qualified voter according to the requirements of the "Act to provide for the more efficient government of the rebel States," passed March 2d, 1867, and the Act supplementary thereto, passed March 23d, 1867, is eligible to office in the provisional government of North and South Carolina. All persons appointed to office will be required to take the oath prescribed by the Act aforesaid, and to file the same, duly subscribed and sworn, with the Post Commander.

II. All citizens assessed for taxes and who shall have paid taxes for the current year, are qualified to serve as jurors. It shall be the duty of the proper civil officers charged with providing lists of jurors, to proceed within their several jurisdictions, without delay, and ascertain the names of all qualified persons and place them on the jury lists, and from such revised lists all jurors shall be hereafter summoned and drawn in the manner required by law.

III. All citizens are eligible to follow any licensed calling, employment or vocation, subject to such imperial regulations as may be prescribed by municipal or other competent authority, not inconsistent with common right and the Constitution and laws of the United States. The bond required as security shall not exceed the penal sum of one hundred dollars in the aggregate, double the amount of the bond, over and above just debts, will be sufficient.

IV. The mayors of cities and other municipal and town officers, and all sheriffs, magistrates and police forces, are required to be vigilant and efficient in maintaining order; and in the discharge of their duties they will be expected to co-operate with the military authorities.

V. Post Commanders may summon to their aid whenever the ordinary means at their disposal shall not be sufficient to execute their orders, such of the civil officers and as many of the citizens within the territorial limits of the military post as may be necessary; and the neglect or refusal of any person to aid and assist in the execution of the orders of the commanding officer will be deemed a misdemeanor punishable by such fine and imprisonment as may be imposed by a military tribunal, approved by the Commanding General.

VI. No license for the sale of intoxicating liquors in quantities less than one gallon or to be drunk on the premises, shall be granted to any person other than an inn-keeper; the number of such licenses shall be determined and the tax to be charged for each license shall be prescribed and collected by the municipal and town authorities and appropriated exclusively for the benefit of the poor. If any person shall be found drunk on the premises where liquor is sold the license may be revoked by any magistrate. The tax imposed by the internal revenue laws of the United States is an additional charge, and does not excuse the party from the observance of local regulations nor exempt him from the payment of such other license fees as may be imposed by municipal or other competent authority.

VII. All contracts hereafter made for the manufacture, sale or transportation, storage or insurance of intoxicating liquors shall, within this Military District, be deemed and treated as against public policy, and no civil action, suit or proceeding for the enforcement of any such contract shall be entertained in any court.

VIII. In public conveyance, on railroads, highways, streets or navigable waters, no discrimination because of color or caste shall be made and the common right of all citizens therein shall be recognized and respected. The violation of this regulation will be deemed a misdemeanor and render the offenders liable to arrest and trial by a military tribunal to be designated by the Commanding General, besides such damages as the injured party may sue for and recover in the civil courts.

IX. The remedy by distress for rent is abolished. Where lands are leased or let out for hire or rent, cotton, corn or other produce of the same, when severed from the land, may be impounded; but the same shall not be removed. Any cotton, corn or other produce so impounded shall be held as security for the rent or hire so claimed, and may be sold in satisfaction of any judgment for the same; provided, That any unsatisfied claim for labor bestowed upon the cultivation of such cotton, corn or other produce, shall in no case be postponed to any demand for rent or hire; but to the extent of such claim for labor, there shall be lien on such cotton, corn and other produce, having preference over any claim for rent or hire.

[COMMUNICATED.] Mr. Editor.—Allow us space in your columns to call public attention to the manner in which live stock—such as beef cattle, hogs, sheep, etc., and also poultry—is brought to this market and kept until disposed of.

Stock is frequently brought here on boats, and sometimes kept on board several days, during this hot weather, without a drop of water or mouthful of anything to eat, after having been several days, perhaps, on the passage. It is but reasonable to suppose it becomes feverish and unhealthy, and unfit for food. Still the butchers by this live stock, kill it, and then retail it out to everybody.

This is very wrong indeed; and as every family buys more or less fresh meat from the butchers, it is reasonable to suppose that they frequently buy that which is really not fit to eat.

We hope some steps will be taken by the city authorities to put a stop to this.
