HEADQ'RS SECOND MILITARY DISTRICT, ! CHARLESTON, S. C., May 30, 1867. GENERAL ORDERS.

No. 32 I. Any citizen, a qualified voter according to the requirements of the "Act to provide for the more efficient government of the rebel States," passed March 2d, 1867, and the Act supplementary thereto, passed March 23d, 1867, is eligible to office in the provisional government of North and South Carolina.
