SIR CHRISTOPHER WREN'S MALLET .- At a late general meeting of the London and Middlesex Archeological Society, the original mallet with which it is said King Charles II. laid the first stone of St. Paul's, was exhibited.
The inscription is on a silver plate let into the head. It is as follows: "By order of the M. W. the Grand Master, his Royal Highness the Duke of Sussex, &c., and W. Master of the Lodge of Antiquity, and with the concurrence of the brethren of the Lodge, this plate has been engraved and affixed to this mallet, A. L. 5831, A. 13, 1827. To commemorate that this being the same mallet with which his Majesty King Charles II. levelled the foundation stone of St. Paul's Cathedral, A. L. 5677, A. D. 1673, was presented the old Lodge of St. Paul's, now the Lodge of Antiquity, acting by memorial constitution. By Bro. Sir Christopher Wren, R. W. D. G. M. Worshipful Master of the Lodge, and Architect of that
