As to what is called the "iron-clad oath," of which he speaks, it has never been presented to me; and further, at the time the above article was published I had not taken any oath as municipal officer of the City of New Bern. So it will be seen that it is ahead of time, which shows evident haste to circulate what is not true.

My advice is, should there be any desire to make statements about me again, that the above heading should be observed.

[COMMUNICATED.] A Hit at Barbers.

No trade or profession in the South is carried on more exclusively by colored men, than that of the barbers; and no class of colored men have a greater share of influence with, and confidence of the colored people than they. At least this has been so in the past, but it seems now to be undergoing a very decided change. In olden times, for a colored man to become very popular; a great favorite with everybody; to be everything; do everything; know everything; say everything, and to be a lacky for the gentlemen, he had only to become a barber. Barbers generally are right clever fellows, though, and some of them are worthy of the confidence reposed in them, but with only one or two honorable exceptions, they are all, as it seems, by mutual arrangement and understanding, keeping up a certain rule, which, in the good old times when "col-ored men had no rights that barbers or any-body else were bound to respect," did very well; but not now since that doctrine has become a dead letter, they are very justly incurring the condemnation of the entire colored population. And why? Because no class of men in any line of business are now making these barbers, with one or two exceptions, do make, and that against their own race.

I know of no place of business in New Bern where colored men cannot go and be served with the same attention and courtesy that is where colored men cannot go and be served with the same attention and courtesy that is given to other men, except these same barber shops. Some white men who have no scruples about serving a colored man for his money, shops. Some white men who have no scraptes about serving a colored man for his money, which they seem to value as high as anybody else's, and which never seems to hurt them, will go to the barber and tell him that if he will withdraw his patronage within fifteen feet of any of the public pumps shaves niggers, he will withdraw his patronage from his shop; and the barber is fool enough to brand his own brethren and himself for fifteen cents, or perhaps only the promise of it. The law the progress of events, military orders, or respect for race, does not move barbers. They still obstinately refuse to obey and comply. But colored men have some sense and pride, and they will not any longer be shipped into a dirty, dark back room to be shaved between chances. I have heard of a colored man thus being shaved, and upon the entrance of a white man, he was left with one side of his face shaved and the other not. The barber did not get a chance to return and The barber did not get a chance to return and complete the job, and after waiting two hours, the poor fellow had to leave and excited no little laughter as he passed through the street in this odd condition.

The writer of this is himself, a colored man, who, he thinks is as decent in his person and habits and stands as fair in society as the quainted barber of the city, and yet he is positively refused a shave in the shop of a personal friend, simply because he is the same color of himself. But a certain man who every holy knows to he literally covered with every body knows to be literally covered with vermin has been seated and shaved. Now if a barber keeps a decent shop for decent people, why not admit all the decent and exclude all the indecent, regardless of color? Or, if they intend to live by their old rule, I say let them die by it too, and be taken out on two sticks and buried by those they, so faithfully serve.

Barbers, too, are generally politicians, and some of them are ambitious and aspiring. It was thought once that the city of New Bern would be honored with a Mayor of that profession, but that did not come to pass in those days, though it may in the fulness of time, it having been laid on or under the shelf

Sanitary Notice!

Ordinance for Sanitary Purposes.

1. It is ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of New Bern, That the occupants of each and every lot in the city (and in case the lot is unoccupied the owner thereof) are hereby ordered to collect and deposit in barrels, or other suitable receptacles, all refuse matter, garbage, ashes and filth of every de-scription, that may accumulate on their respective lots, dwelling places, or business stands, and to place such barrels or other receptacles on the sidewalks in front of their respective lots, on Monday and Thursday mornings of each week, before the hour of 8

2. It is further ordained, That all decayed animal or vegetable matter or offal, garbage or sweepings of any kind, collecting in or around the stalls of any public or private market, shall be deposited by the occupants of said stalls in fit and proper receptacles, and placed in convenient localities for removal before the hour 2 o'clock p. m. of each day.

3. It is further ordained, That all persons are prohibited from throwing any offal, rub-bish, garbage, sweepings or refuse matter of any kind whatever, into any of the slips or docks around the city, or upon the walks, streets, lanes and public highways within the city limits.

4. It is further ordained, That hereafter no sinks or privies shall be dug or excavated for more than two feet from the surface of the surrounding ground.

5. It is further ordained. That each and every so great a distinction on account of color as these barbers, with one or two exceptions, do have all sinks, water-closets or privies which may be upon his property, cleaned out or dis-infected by the use of copperas, chloride of lime or other suitable disinfectant, whenever

10. It is further ordained, That all persons are prohibited from keeping any live hogs within the City limits from the 1st day of May to the 31st day of October.

11. It is further ordained, That no grave shall be dug in any of the Cemeteries in and around the City, unless it be at least five feet

around the City, without special permit from the Sanitary Committee of the City Council.

13. It is further ordained, That any person violating any of the foregoing ordinances shall, upon conviction before the Mayor, be fined a sum not excelling fifty dollars for each and every offence, and if any person shall fail to pay such fine he shall be ordered to work upon the public streets a sufficient length of time to compensate for the amount of such fine in accordance with the law of the State for such cases provided.

14. It is further ordained, That all previous Ordinances passed by the City or Town Government and conflicting herewith, are hereby repealed.
