BURIAL OF C. S. PRIMROSE.—The entire Fire Department turned out Tuesday afternoon to escort the remains of their late fellowmember to their place of sepulture in Cedar Grove Cemetery. The funeral was a very large one, and the ceremonies were conducted by the Rev. E. M. Forbes, Rector of Christ Church. The death of Mr. Primrose is severely felt by his relatives, and time alone can assuage their grief.

DESPERATE ASSAULT AND PROBABLE MURnen.-On Tuesday night last, shortly after 10 o'clock, the report spread rapidly that a brutal murder had been perpetrated in the upper part of the city, creating an excitement to which the citizens of New Bern have been strangers for a long time.

The Chief of Police, Sergeant Colligan, was speedily at the scene of the encounter, and succeeded in arresting a female named Ann Sauls at a dwelling house on Queen st., near the junction of Broad, who was charged with committing a deadly assault, with intent to kill, on the person of another female named Kate Bailey, whose name has figured her etofore in the reports of the Mayor's Court.

The affray occurred where the arrest was effected. We (reporter) visited the injured woman at a late hour of the night, and found her in an extremely precarious condition, her head and face being a conglomerate mass of coagulated blood and mangled flesh, exhibiting a deep penetrating wound under the left eye, from which the blood was flowing in one continous stream, the bed being drenched in the poor victim's gore. Every attention was given to the poor sufferer by order of Sergeant Colligan, (by the young colored women who administered to her wants) and the city Physiclan summened. But little hopes are entertained of the unfortunate woman's recovery.

Resolved, That we wear the usual badge of

Editor New Bern Republican:

In looking over the pages of the Journal of Commerce I saw a letter written by Henry R. Bryan, Esq., to gentlemen of Bay River, Craven County, and through them he addresses the black men. As to the correctness of the position taken by the writer, I will leave that for those to decide who have noticed the conflict between truth and error.

In Mr. Bryan's prefatory remarks he says: "And like Paul, the great Apostle of the Gentiles, we can boast that we were born free." I think, as did Paul when he was before Agrip pa and permitted to speak for himself—"I shall answer for myself and my people." Mr. B. calls us friends; that is true. Then he directs our thoughts to the days of slavery; and then tries to beget a spirit of hate in us against the white men of Massachusetts. Well may he think of the words of the poet-" Whom the gods would destroy they first make mad." John the Baptist said of men whose hearts were not right; "Oh, generation of vipers."

Mr. B. says you had, as free persons of color before the war, the same right to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness, that he had. As the writer has been permitted to inform his mind from lawyers such as Hale, Blackstone, Forbes, Pratt, &c.-we will not attempt to argue the point, but will present a few facts in the premises. Mr. B. will remember that I have paid taxes for twenty-one years in this the State of my birth; and now to the point as to the liberty of free black men before the war and the liberty of Mr. B. As a white man he paid taxes, and that gave him the right of way to all the paths of peace and learning in his State; and he could go out of it and stay one or twenty years and return, and would not have to prove that he was free. The black man, whom he says had equal liberty with-

The school was kept from us; the parish gate notified to leave in twenty days; if we did not Caroline Woodard and Martha Wright were the forfeiture was five hundred dollars or detained in the station house, in default of slavery. Our liberty was so precious that in 1835 we lost our vote. I do not know whether Mr. B. has lost his or not, but I hope he has not, as he says we are brothers. In the Southern Rights Convention which assembled at Baltimore June 8th, 1860, a resolution was adopted calling on the Legislature to pass a law driving the free colored people out of the enthusiasm, and a very interesting meeting State. A majority of the States were in favor of this.

Now, Mr. Editor, I cannot for my life come to the conclusion that our liberty was the same. We can well exclaim: "Verily the hands are the hands of Esau, but the voice is that of Jacob."

But this is not all yet. We see threats to the black men as well as abuse of the whites. We stand on the defensive, and will stand on the Republican platform so long as we can read on its banner Civil Rights to all, Ishmaelites or not. We have built churches, educated men to preach, but many have said "let their

blood be on us and on our children." Mr. B. tells us what was done for us by the white men. We thank them for it; but as emancipation was a military necessity we think that the action of said Convention was a political expediency.

Mr. B. tells us to vote for the best man. As we do not know who that man is, we ask for information. He invites our attention to the great Conservative party. Now, as a black man, my advice to my brethren is that they fellow it as the Disciples at one time followed the Lord-at a great distance.

Sanitary Notice!

Ordinance for Sanitary Purposes.

1. It is ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of New Bern, That the occupants of each and every lot in the city (and in case the lot is unoccupied the owner thereof) are liereby ordered to collect and deposit in barrels or other suitable receptacles, all refuse matter, garbage, ashes and filth of every description, that may accumulate on their respective lots, dwelling places, or business stands, and to place such barrels or other receptacles on the sidewalks in front of their respective lots, on Monday and Thursday respective lots, on Monday and Thursday mornings of each week, before the hour of 8

2. It is further ordained. That all decayed animal or vegetable matter or offal, garbage or sweepings of any kind, collecting in or around the stalls of any public or private market, shall be deposited by the occupants of said stalls in fit and proper receptacles, and placed in convenient localities for removal before the hour 2 o'clock p. m. of each day.

8. It is further ordained, That all persons are prohibited from throwing any offal, rub-

bish, garbage, sweepings or refuse matter of any kind whatever, into any of the slips or docks around the city, or upon the walks, streets, lanes and public highways within the city limits.

4. It is further ordained, That hereafter no sinks or privies shall be dug or excavated for more than two feet from the surface of the

surrounding ground.

5. Rie further ordained, That each and every property owner within the City limits shall have all sinks, water-closets or privies which may be upon his property, cleaned out or dis-infected by the use of copperas, chloride of lime or other suitable disinfectant, whenever such cleaning or disinfecting may become necessary, or whenever notice to that effect may be served upon such property owner by the Sanitary Committee of the Board of

Council. 6. It is further ordained, That no person shall feed, water, wash or clean any animal within fifteen feet of any of the public pumps

of this City.
7. It is further ordained, That all persons are prohibited from throwing anything into any of the public pumps, wells or reservoirs of the City, or impair their utility in any man-

8. It is further ordained, That no person shall convey to, sell or offer for sale any damaged or spoiled meat, fish, corn, wheat, rye, oats, peas or other articles of food within the jurisdiction of the City authorities. 9. It is further ordained, That no cattle or

swne shall be slaughtered within the City 10. It is further ordained, That all persons are prohibited from keeping any live hogs within the City limits from the 1st day of

May to the 31st day of October. 11. It is further ordained, That no grave shall be dug in any of the Cemeteries in and around the City, unless it be at least five feet 12. It is further ordained, That no corpse

shall be removed from the Cemeteries, in and around the City, without special permit from the Sanitary Committee of the City Council. 13. It is further ordained, That any person violating any of the foregoing ordinances shall, upon conviction before the Mayor, be fined a sum not excelling fifty dollars for each and every offence, and if any person shall fail to pay such fine he shall be ordered to work upon the public streets a sufficient length of time to compensate for the amount of such fine in ac-

cordance with the law of the State for such 14. It is further ordained. That all previous Ordinances passed by the City or Town Government and conflicting herewith, are hereby
