veto and defiance contempt of the legislative power of the people? Some time ago the Washington organ of the administration urged that an interpretation of the law should be put before the several commanders "in such shape that no military officer would dare to treat it with contempt or indifference." It is now for Congress in its July session to put the national will before the President in just that way—so that he will not dare to disobey t, to defy it, to treat it with contempt and tramole upon it, as he has done on the one already ade. It is difficult to see how a law can be nade stronger than the military bill. The problem of the hour is not how to make the ment upon a dogged and hostile Executive.
This is the point for the deliberations of the

HORRIBLE MURDER IN JONES COUNTY.

FIVE PERSONS MURDERED.

r. Richard R. Foscue, his wife, daughters and two grand-children the victims.

HE MURDERERS STILL AT LARGE.

Intelligence reached our city on Saturday norning, of the murder of Mr. Richard Reeves oscue and wife, at their residence on Island reek, in Jones county, about ten miles from his city and within nine miles of Polloksville, n the Beaufort road. A detachment of United tates soldiers was at once sent to the scene of ne murder by Major J. J. Van Horn, of this

Our reporter arrived at Mr. Foscue's house Saturday evening, and learned the followg as the facts in the case: On Friday afteron three colored men came on the premises d demanded money of the ladies in the ise, which was occupied at the time by Mr. oscue and wife, their two daughters and two grand children. Failing to get money from the ladies they took Miss Foscue, Mrs. Owen Witty, and the two children to the smokehouse, and there shot them. Mrs. Owen Witty, Mr. Foscue's daughter, and an infant child of Mrs. Witty's, were killed instantly, vhile Miss Foscue was slightly wounded and eft by the murderers, they evidently thinking er dead. Miss Foscue will no doubt recover rom her injuries. A grand child of Mr. oscue's, the child of Mr. Martin Brock, was hot while in Miss Foscue's arms, and died a ew hours afterwards from the injury. After nurdering the ladies it seems the murderers led Mr. Foscue to a post near his smokeouse, where they stripped him of clothing, ruelly and horribly beat him, and finally illed him by striking him on the head with a aul. The wretches then proceeded to the ouse and completed their horrid work by aurdering Mrs. Foscue. They then ransack d the house, where they obtained a small mount of money, after which they left.

As soon as the murderers were gone Miss Brock with difficulty got out of the smokehouse, and taking the Brock shild with her, made her way to a neighbor's house, where she arrived at daybreak on Saturday. The house in which the murder was committed is some three or four miles from any other imbitation. As soon as intelligence reached the neighbors, Mr. Wm. Foy dispatched messengers to New Bern and Polloksville, asking for aid in pursuing the fugitive murderers. Mr. Barrus, special Magistrate of Jones

county, appointed Mr. John Pearce, formerly of New Bern, as special Coroner for the occaion, who, after summoning a jury, proceeded o the place of the murder and held an inquest, t which the above facts were elicited. The oldiers sent from New Bern were already at e place where the Coroner arrived. Immelately after the inquest, they started in pur-uit of the murderers, Col. J. W. Whittford aving volunteered his aid as guide.

It is to be hoped that the demons who per-

etrated this more than hellish outrage may be vertaken. Mr. and Mrs. Foscue were both over 60 ars of age, and neither they nor the young lies could offer any resistance to the robbers; the fiends seemed to have thirsted for od, and thus cruelly butchered five helpless w creatures. Our reporter describes the c at the house as most horrible. Mr. eue was found dead, still tied to the post, tolence on his naked body. Mrs. Whitty

and her child were lying drenched in blood in the smoke house, and Mrs. Foscue was dead upon her bed in the house. Mr. Foscue was a quiet, upright citizen, who, with his family was much loved and respected by all who knew them. These murderers have thrown a gloom over the entire neighborhood. We sincerely hope that no means will be spared to bring the authors of the masacre to justice.

Sanitary Notice!

Ordinance for Sanitary Purposes.

1. It is ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of New Bern, That the occupants of each and every lot in the city (and in case the lot is unoccupied the owner thereof) are hereby ordered to collect and deposit in barrels, or other suitable receptacles, all refuse matter, garbage, ashes and fifth of every description, that may accumulate on their respective lots, dwelling places, or business stands, and to place such barrels or other receptacles on the sidewalks in front of their respective lots, on Monday and Thursday respective lots, on Monday and Thursday mornings of each week, before the hour of 8

2. It is further ordained, That all decayed animal or vegetable matter or offal, garbage or sweepings of any kind, collecting in or around the stalls of any public or private market, shall be deposited by the occupants of said stalls in fit and proper receptacles, and placed in convenient localities for removal before the hour 2 o'clock p. m. of each day.

3. It is further ordained, That all persons are prohibited from throwing any offal, rubbish, garbage, sweepings or refuse matter of any kind whatever, into any of the slips or

docks around the city, or upon the walks, streets, lanes and public highways within the 4. It is further ordained, That hereafter no sinks or privies shall be dug or excavated for more than two feet from the surface of the

surrounding ground.

5. It is further ordained, That each and every property owner within the City limits shall have all sinks, water-closets or privies which may be upon his property, cleaned out or dis-infected by the use of copperas, chloride of lime or other suitable disinfectant, whenever such cleaning or disinfecting may become necessary, or whenever notice to that effect may be served upon such property owner by the Sanitary Committee of the Board of

6. It is further ordained, That no person shall feed, water, wash or clean any animal within fifteen feet of any of the public pumps

7. It is further ordained, That all persons are prohibited from throwing anything into any of the public pumps, wells or reservoirs of the City, or impair their utility in any man-8. It is further ordained, That no person

shall convey to, sell or offer for sale any dam aged or spoiled meat, fish, corn, wheat, rye, oats, peas or other articles of food within the jurisdiction of the City authorities. 9. It is further ordained, That no cattle or swne shall be slaughtered within the City

10. It is further ordained, That all persons are prohibited from keeping any live hogs within the City limits from the 1st day of May to the 31st day of October. 11. It is further ordained, That no grave shall be dug in any of the Cemeteries in and around the City, unless it be at least five feet

12. It is further ordained, That no corpse shall be removed from the Cemeteries, in and around the City, without special permit from the Sanitary Committee of the City Council. 13. It is further ordained, That any person violating any of the foregoing ordinances shall, upon conviction before the Mayor, be fined sam not excelling fifty dollars for each and every offence, and if any person shall fail to pay such fine he shall be ordered to work upon the public streets a sufficient length of time to compensate for the amount of such fine in accordance with the law of the State for such cases provided.

14. It is further ordained. That all previous Ordinances passed by the City or Town Gov-ernment and conflicting herewith, are hereby repealed. June 6- '67-tf.
