**BANKRUPT ACT.**—We have been informed by Charles Hibbard, Esq., Clerk of the United States District Court, that he has received a complete copy of the Bankrupt Act, and is willing to give all the information that may be desired in reference to the same. He also states that he will shortly receive from the Government Printers, Messrs. Phelps & Solomon, a complete assortment of the different forms that are necessary for the successful carrying forward of a case of this particular kind, and will be ready to distribute the same to the three Registers that have been appointed in the District which Mr. Hibbard has jurisdiction of.

**NEW BERN BY DAYLIGHT AND GASLIGHT.**—In our first issue of next week we shall contain a series of sketches under the above caption. During our long residence in this City our experience has been such as to render us capable of presenting to the public a succession of papers replete with absorbing interest. We must confess that we are greatly indebted to Officer McDermott of the Police force, for the invaluable aid he has rendered us in this connection. Mr. McDermott's life long services as a Policeman in London, New York, and New Bern has enabled him to assist us most materially in our researches.

**CAPTURE OF WASHINGTON HICKS.**—The notorious Washington Hicks, alias Herring, has turned up again.  
This desperate wretch was the leader of Malcolm White's organized band of burglars that alarmed our city and neighborhood by their repeated burglaries and depredations; and who broke open Capt. A. H. Foster's Big Boot store and were apprehended and lodged in Craven street jail one year ago last May.—The particulars of his arrest are familiar to all. Hicks, with the rest of the gang, ten in number, and Malcolm White, made their escape from the jail by breaking through the rear wall of the brick building. None were retaken except Malcolm White, who was convicted in the full term of the Superior Court, publicly whipped by the Sheriff and imprisoned for three months.  
The subject of this present sketch, Hicks, or Herring, has been heard of twice since, once at Norfolk, Virginia, and again at New Bern, about three weeks ago. He fled, however, before the Sheriff was aware of his presence, and his retreat was undiscovered until last Sunday night, when he shot and mortally wounded another colored man near Beaufort, N. C., for declaring that he (Hicks) was the man who had broken out of the jail at New Bern. Fleeing again he was pursued by a party of about two hundred colored men and some whites, (whose vigilance and prompt action deserve all commendation) who came up with him on the lot of Mrs. Mace, in Beaufort, where he was surrounded and secured. At last accounts Mace was still alive but was not expected to live. Sheriff Harper left on the cars last evening to take him into custody and cage him up in an impregnable dungeon in his old home—Craven street jail. We see no escape for the miscreant now from the hangman's rope.

**STEAMSHIP ELLEN S. TERRY.** Goodspeed Line, arrived here before daylight Tuesday morning, having left New York Saturday morning.  
She will sail for New York at 4 p. m. this afternoon.

The Hon. J. D. Campbell, late United States Minister to Mexico, arrived at Washington on Sunday night, and had an interview with the Assistant Secretary of State. It appears that Mr. Campbell had peremptory orders from Mr. Seward to remain in New Orleans, and no orders to go to Mexico in search of President Juarez were received by him until the first of the present month. The instructions then given him were to proceed to Mexico and take his station near President Juarez, but no method of conveyance was indicated by which he could get there. Mr. Campbell, it seems, was ill with an attack of fever when these instructions reached him. He at once set about procuring a vessel for the journey, but he was unable to obtain any. Finding there was no means of transportation, he telegraphed to the Department to have a vessel assigned for his use, which request was refused. His orders were emphatic to join the Mexican President, and he found it impossible to do except by journeying over land with blankets and provisions. He telegraphed to Mr. Seward tendering his resignation, which was accepted, and another minister appointed.

The reported agrarian speech of Senator Wade, proves to have been the invention of a sensation writer. Mr. Wade stamps the current report of his remarks on that occasion as a garbled account from the pen of a man who purposely misunderstood him, and pertinently remarks, "Why, sir, if you would make an equitable distribution of all the property in the United States to-day among the people, in five years it would again be in the hands of a few men. Such a measure would not be just, nor would it be of any practicable advantage to the poor people if done. The editors and correspondents who have been writing about my speech know very well I am not in favor of such a foolish thing as the distribution of property, or disturbing in any way property rights."

**ATTENTION! Sanitary Notice!**

Ordinance for Sanitary Purposes.  
1. It is ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of New Bern, That the occupants of each and every lot in this city, and in case of the lot is unoccupied the owner thereof, are hereby ordered to collect and deposit in barrels, or other suitable receptacles, all refuse matter, garbage, ashes and filth of every description, that may accumulate on their respective lots, dwelling places, or business stands, and to place such barrels or other receptacles on the sidewalks in front of their respective lots, on Monday and Thursday mornings of each week, before the hour of 9 a. m.

2. It is further ordained, That all decayed animal or vegetable matter or offal, garbage or sweepings of any kind, collected in or around the stalls of any public or private market, shall be deposited by the occupants of said stalls in fit and proper receptacles, and placed in convenient localities for removal before the hour 2 o'clock p. m. of each day.

3. It is further ordained, That all persons are prohibited from throwing any offal, rubbish, garbage, sweepings or refuse matter of any kind whatever, into any of the slips or docks around the city, or upon the walks, streets, lanes and public highways, within the city limits.

4. It is further ordained, That hereafter no sinks or privies shall be dug or excavated for more than two feet from the surface of the surrounding ground.

5. It is further ordained, That each and every property owner within the City limits shall have all sinks, water-closets or privies which may be upon his property, cleaned out or disinfected by the use of coppers, chloride of lime or other suitable disinfectant, whenever such cleaning or disinfecting may become necessary, or whenever notice to that effect may be served upon such property owner by the Sanitary Committee of the Board of Council.

6. It is further ordained, That no person shall use water, wash or clean any animal within fifteen feet of any of the public pumps of this City.

7. It is further ordained, That all persons are prohibited from throwing anything into any of the public pumps, wells or reservoirs of the City, or impair their utility in any manner.

8. It is further ordained, That no person shall convey to, sell or offer for sale any animal damaged or spoiled meat, fish, corn, wheat, rye, oats, peas or other articles of food within the jurisdiction of the City authorities.

9. It is further ordained, That no cattle or swine shall be slaughtered within the City limits.

10. It is further ordained, That all persons are prohibited from keeping any live hogs within the City limits from the 1st day of May to the 31st day of October.

11. It is further ordained, That no grave shall be dug in any of the Cemeteries in and around the City, unless it be at least five feet deep.

12. It is further ordained, That no corpse shall be removed from the Cemeteries, in and around the City, without special permit from the Sanitary Committee of the City Council.

13. It is further ordained, That any person violating any of the foregoing ordinances shall, upon conviction before the Mayor, be fined a sum not exceeding fifty dollars for each and every offence, and if any person shall fail to pay such fine he shall be ordered to work upon the public streets a sufficient length of time to compensate for the amount of such fine in accordance with the law of the State for such cases provided in the Code of Laws of this State.

14. It is further ordained, That all previous Ordinances passed by the City or Town Government and conflicting herewith, are hereby repealed.
