REGISTRATION A PRACTICAL REALITY The announcement of the appointment

of registers for the different counties of North Carolina, by General Sickles, shows that the highly important work of registration is to commence without delay.

Although this process of registration seems to be quite well understood, we cannot too strongly tirge its importance upon every voter. In the first place, let it be universally understood that while the act of registration does not mean voting, that no man will be permitted to vote unless his name is first properly registered. This fact addresses itself with equal force to every one who knows himself entitled to vote, whether white or

For the county of Craven, (a very large county) we see that only three boards of registration have been appointed. Whether any additional board will yet be designated, we are not prepared to state, but think it probable such will not

In the event that registration is thus left exclusively to the boards already selected, it will be seen the labor to be performed is by no means a trifling one. We think, however, that the registers selected will prove equal and competent to the

Whether the different boards will be confined in their work to certain and deffinate localities, or permitted to visit different places and precincts is yet to be

Should this county, for instance, only have three places for registration, the work of registering will be attended with considerable trouble on the part of voters, and hence the deep interest that ought to be taken in the matter by every loyal

By the last act of Congress in relation to registration, it will be observed that the commanding General is allowed until the first day of October next, to complete the work of registration. We scarcely anticipate all this time allowed will actually be required in performing the work. The future will test the matter,

After the registration has all been completed so as to be certified to by the commanding General, then he is to give thirty days notice of the election to be held for members of the Constitutional Convention. It is possible, therefore, that with all the work necessarially to be performed in the full and final completion of registration, the election for members of the Constitutional Convention in North Carolina will not be held before the first day of November next. It may occur previous to that date, but as matters stand at present we anticipate it will not
