THE PENALTY DEATH!

FRIDAY, July 26, 1867. The State se. Lewis Albritton, indicted for

Highway Robbery. The Court assigned John N. Washington and Alexander Justice, Esq'rs, counsel for the

prisoner. Mr. Cloero Green Sworn :- On Thursday of the last Criminal Court I started with my wife in a buggy from this city for my home. It being very hot I gave the reins to my wife, and was reading a book, when she exclain Don't you see that man?" I looked out and saw the prisoner at the bar in the road, ahead of the horse, with a pistol pointed at me. He ordered us to get out of the buggy, which we did. There was another man in the rear of us. The prisoner demanded and took my pocket-book, containing \$80, and then forced us into the woods adjoining. This was on the Neuse Road, about one mile and a half from town. They also took my watch and searched my wife's pockets. The prison at the bar was the man-I am certain of it. They said they were acting under the orders of their Captain, and that they had to obey them. The man who robbed me of my pocket book had lost two front teeth, and had an impediment in his speech. [Here the prisoner was told to stand up and exhibit his

teeth, which he did, showing a loss of two in

the upper row.] I was under his charge for a dam by the Bohogus Wool-Pulling Company, on the positioner at the bas is the man. Orges-coamined by Mesers. Washington and Justice :-- I am perfectly sure that is the man as much so as I am that you are Mr. Washing-

Solicitor Clark and the counsel for the de fence made brief addresses to the Jury, and His Honor charged the Jury briefly and decidedly, who, after an absence of about five minutes, returned a verdict of "Guilty."

The Solicitor then prayed the judgment of the Court, whereupon the prisoner was asked if he had anything to say, why sentence of death should not be pronounced against him, The culprit arose and denied that he was

the man; furthermore, that he had never pointed a pistol at any man in his life, betraying a very great impediment in his speech as sworn to by Mr. Green.

He was now sentenced by Judge Green to be hung on Friday the 16th day of August, between the hours of 12 and 2. This is the same day set apart for the execution of Banvester Heywood.

A T A TERM OF THE DISTRICT COURT OF the United States of America for the District of North Carolina, held at Elizabeth City in said District, on the — day of July, 1867.

R is ordered, That the following rule, order, and regulation be prescribed as a rule governing proceedings in Bankruptcy in the District Court of Familico, in the District of North Carolina, under the act entitled "An Act to establish a uniform system of Bankruptcy throughout the United States," approved March 26, 1867, in addition to and with reference to the "General Orders in Bankruptcy," and the form specified in the schedule thereto annexed, framed by the Justices of the Supreme Court of the United States, in pursuance of the 16th Section of said act, and approved by said Court, and promalgated May 16th, 1867.

BULE FIRST.—In voluntary Bankruptcy where the petition states that the debtor, whether an individual, a co-partnership, a joint stock company, or a corporation has resided or carried on business for the six months in ext immediately preceding the time of filing the petition, or for the longest period during such six months in any one of the counties within the District of Pamilico, the petitions shall be referred to the Register nominated and appointed for the Congressional District of which such county so stated in the petition forms a part, except the counties of Pitt and Wilson. Voluntary applications in behalf of debtors residing in said counties, shall be referred to E. W. JONES, Esq., Register; except in such cases as the Counsel filing the petition shall request in writing a reference to some other Register.

City Tax Ordinances.

MAYOR'S OFFICE. NEW BERN, N. C., July 23d, 1867. Sec. 1. It is ordained, by the Mayor and Council of the city of New Bern that a monthly license-tax, for the month of Aug., A. D., 1867, be, and the same is hereby levical on the various business occupations, trades, and pro-fessions of the citizens of New Bern, as follows:

Sec. 2. All citizens or persons engaged in or practicing any of the occupations, trades or professions herein specified and taxed, and who may purpose to continue in the same, shall call on the City Clerk at his office, within the first ten days of the month of August aforesaid, and obtain license for the same.

Sec. 3. Any person who shall commence a business, trade, or profession, as herein specified, after the first day of Aug., aforesaid, and within the aforesaid term of Aug., shall be allowed five days from the date of said com-mencement in which to obtain license, and a ro-rata tax shall be charged in such cases, for the unexpired part of said term. No license, however, shall be issued, except on the payment of at least twenty-five cents.

Sec. 4. Any person who shall continue or commence a business, trade, or profession, as herein specified and shall neglect to obtain license for the same, as herein ordained, shall pay a double taz for said neglect.

(1.) On each and every merchant; mercantile firm; shop-keeper; book-seller and sta-tioner, and confectioner, whose gross sales per month, amount to two thousand dollars or less, one-half per centum on said sales: Provided, that when said sales shall include a fractional part of one hundred dollars less than fifty, said fractional part shall not be taxed; and that, when said fractional part shall amount to fifty or more, it shall be counted and taxed as an additional one hundred dollars to said sales; and, provided, further, that no sales suall be reckoned to be less than fifty dollars per month.

(2.) On all bankers and brokers; commission, shipping, receiving and forwarding merchants; express companies; and insurance agents, whose receipts or earnings amount to four hundred dollars or less; and real estate agents whose receipts or earnings amount to two hundred dollars or less; two and half per cent on said receipts: Provided, that no excess of receipts above the said amounts of four hundred and two hundred, respectively, is taxable.

(3.) On all boarding houses and hotels whose receipts, per month, are fifty dollars or over, one half per cent on said receipts: Proded, that no excess of said receipts above five hundred dollars in the case of boarding houses, and two thousand dollars in the case of hotels, is taxable.

(4.) On all auctioneers; bar-rooms; and lumber dealers, who saw their lumber: ten dollars......\$10,00 (5.) Club or eating houses: cotton gins and presses; coal and wood vards; grist mills; itinerant merchants, who sell by sample; lumber dealers, who do not saw their lumber; peddlers of all classes; planing machines; steam railways; musical entertainments, for profit or reward; all shows and theatrical exhi-

grist mill, planing machine, or steam railway is connected with a saw mill and worked by the same engine, one-half only of the tax levied on these subjects shall be collected. (6.) On all turpentine distilleries, upon

the capacity of the still or stills employed: forty cents per barrel..... Provided, That when the capacity exceeds fifty barrels the excess is not taxable. (7.) On all artists, including typists and limners; boot and shoe-makers; gas

fitters; house painters; livery stable keepers; lawyers; makers of wagons and other riding vehicles; master builders, including house and ship builders and brick masons; machinists; milliners; physicians; dentists; printers and publishers; sash, blind and door makers; sail makers; tailors; tin and sheet iron workers; undertakers; watch makers; jewelers: four dollars......\$4 00

(8.) On all bakers, barbers, and blacksmiths who keep a shop; boat builders and repairers, who may keep railways other than steam; billiard rooms, for each table used; bowling alleys; cabinet makers, carpenters, coopers; coppersmiths, clothes cleaners and dyers, gunsmiths and mantua makers, who keep a shop; harness makers; oyster houses or restaurants; paper hangers; pleasure boats, kept for hire; sign painters, who keep a shop; public two-horse wagons,

drays, or other two horse vehicles; and wheelwrights: two dollars...... \$2 00 Provided, If paper hanging be joined with house painting, and mantua making with a millinery, then only one-half of the tax levied on paper hanging and mantua making shall be collected; and provided, further, that wag on and riding vehicle makers, and machinists may keep a blacksmith shop, and master house builders a carpenter shop, as an adjunct to their respective trades; and wagon and riding vehicle makers act as wheelwrights, with

out being taxed for the same. (9.) On all market stalls where butchers's meats only are sold: two dollars and fifty cents...... \$2 50 (10.) On all market stalls, where dead or live poultry only is sold; on all fish stands, to be kept near the river; and on all public one-horse carts, drays, or oth-

er one-horse vehicles: one dollar \$1 00 (11.) On all market stalls, where vegetables only are sold; on all eating stands or shapties, where a table is spread for the accommodation of transient passers by; on all street hucksters of bread. cakes, pies and fruits, vegetables, fish
