To Purify a Skin.

In hot weather it is almost impossible to

prevent skin becoming foul, unless some

chemical preparation is used. One pound of

copper dissolved in four gallons of water,

poured over a skin three or four times, will

completely destroy the offensive odor.

As a disinfector to scatter around premises

affected with any unpleasant odor, nothing

is better than a mixture of four parts ground

pepper to one part of charcoal by weight.

All sorts of glass vessels and other

utensils may be effectually purified from

offensive smells by rinsing them with

carbonate of soda and sand and soap.
