AN ORDINANCE

To lay Taxes, and Provide for the Support of the City Government.

Sec. 1. It is ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of New Berne, That for the fiscal year ending June 30th 1869, a tax of one percent upon the value of all real estate within the limits of the corporation, be and the same is hereby laid to be collected as by law provided.

Sec. 2. It is further ordained, That from and after the 1st day of April, 1869, no person, firm or corporation shall prosecute or carry on either of the trades or occupations mentioned in Section 6 of this ordinance, until he or they shall have obtained a license therefor in the manner hereinafter provided.

Sec. 3. It is further ordained, That every person or persons desiring to obtain a license shall register with the City Clerk, first, his name, or their name or style; second, the trade or occupation for which a license is desired; third, the place where such trade or occupation is to be carried on; fourth, if an inn-keeper, the yearly rental of the house and property to be occupied for said purpose; and thereupon, upon payment to the City Clerk or other person authorized to collect the tax herein provided, shall make out and deliver a license for such trade or occupation, which license shall continue in force for one month, at the place or premises described therein.

Sec. 4. It is further ordained, That if any person or persons shall exercise or carry on any trade or business hereinafter mentioned for the exercising of which a license is required, without taking out such license as is herein provided, he, she, or they shall, for every such offence, respectively forfeit a penalty equal to three times the amount of the sum of money imposed for such license to the use of the city.

Sec. 5. And be it further ordained, That in every case where more than one of the persons hereinafter described shall be carried on by the same person, at the same place at the same time, except as therein mentioned, license must be taken out for each, according to the rates severally prescribed.

Sec. 6. And be it further ordained, That on and after the first day of April, 1869, for each license granted the sum herewith stated, shall be respectively and monthly paid. Any number of persons carrying on any business coming within the purview of this ordinance, in partnership may transmit such business as such license, under such license, and not otherwise.

(1.) Bankers shall pay ten dollars for each license, and every person shall be deemed a banker within the meaning of this Ordinance, who keeps a place of business where credits are opened in favor of any person or firm, by the deposit or collection of money or currency, or the sale, or any part thereof, of any note, bill, or remitted upon the draft or check of such creditor.

(2.) Auctioneers, shall pay ten dollars for license. Any person who is licensed as an auctioneer, shall be deemed an auctioneer, if he or she is engaged in the sale of property for sale to the highest bidder.

(3.) Retail Dealers in liquors, including all distilled or fermented liquors, and wines of every description, shall pay five dollars for each license. Every person who shall sell or offer for sale such liquors in less quantity than one gallon at one time, to the same purchaser, shall be regarded a retail dealer in liquors.

(4.) Retail Dealers shall pay one dollar for each license. Every person whose occupation it is to sell or offer for sale groceries or any goods, wares or merchandise, or foreign or domestic produce, in less quantities than a whole retail package, at one time to the same person not including wines, spirituous or malt liquors, shall be regarded as a retail dealer.

(5.) Wholesale Dealers shall pay four dollars for each license. Every person whose occupation or business it is to sell groceries or any goods, wares or merchandise, by one or more retail packages or pieces at one time, to the same purchaser, or wines and liquors in quantities of more than one gallon, shall be deemed a wholesale dealer.

(6.) Hotels, Inns and Taverns, shall pay five dollars for each license. Every place where food and lodging are provided for and furnished to travellers or sojourners, in view of payment therefor, shall be regarded as a Hotel, Inn or Tavern.

(7.) Brokers and Commission Merchants shall pay four dollars for each license. Any person except one holding a license as a wholesaler dealer or banker, whose business it is to purchase or sell stocks, money, goods or merchandise, or seek orders therefor in original or unbroken packages, or produce, or to manage business matters for the owners of vessels, or consignors of freight, or whose business it is to purchase, rent or sell real estate for others, shall be regarded as a Broker or Commission Merchant.

(8.) Theaters, Clerks and Jugglers shall pay a sum not to exceed two hundred dollars to be fixed by the City Council in each case.

(9.) Bowling Allys or Billiard Rooms shall pay four dollars for each license.

(10.) Horse Dealers and Livery Stable keepers shall pay four dollars for each license.

State of North Carolina.

Department of Public Instruction,
 Raleigh, N. C., Sept. 10, 1868.
 [CIRCULAR.]

To County Commissioners:

Gentlemen--Your attention is respectfully called to Section 2, Article VII, of the Constitution of this State, whereby a general supervision and control of the Public Schools in the respective Counties is made the duty of the County Commissioners; and also to Article IX, Section 3, which declares the neglect of certain duties on the part of the County Commissioners, in reference to Public Schools, an indictable offence; and which also prescribes that each County in the State shall be divided into a convenient number of Districts. The duty of making this division into Districts, devolves upon the County Commissioners, and is to be performed and reported to the General Assembly "before the first day of January, 1869." See Article VII, Section 3.

In order to ensure a speedy and thorough organization of the Free Public School System, prescribed by the Constitution, it is requisite that this work of Districting the Counties should be hastened to completion. Until this is done provision cannot be made for the establishment and maintenance of Public Instruction.

In establishing these Districts it is desirable that the municipal Districts should be the School Districts; also, that reference should be had, as far as practicable, to school houses already existing; also, except in extreme cases, no District should contain less than thirty pupils between the ages of six and twenty-one years.

Your attention is also called to the orders of the Board of Education, passed September 8, 1868, a certified copy of which is transmitted herewith.

For authority to pass such orders, the Board cite Article IX, Section 9, of the Constitution. Until repealed, these orders have the force and authority of the law.

STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA.

EXECUTIVE CHAMBER,
 RALEIGH, Sept. 9, 1868.

At a meeting of the Board of Education, held this day, it was

VOTED, That by virtue of the authority vested in this Board by Article IX, Section 9, of the Constitution of the State, it is hereby

Ordered, That until otherwise enacted, the County Commissioners of the several Counties of the State be, and hereby are, directed to assume without delay, the duties of "Superintendents of Common Schools," and that they appoint not more than three Committeemen in each District in their County, who shall be the legal successors of the Committeemen retained or appointed, in accordance with an act entitled "An Act to protect certain interests of the Common Schools, and for other purposes," passed February 28th, A. D. 1867.

That the County Commissioners of each County require from the Board of Superintendents of Common Schools an official report of the action of said Board of Superintendents, also a specific statement under oath, of the funds and securities which have been, and are now, in the possession of the Chairman of said Board of Superintendents, and that a certified copy of said report be transmitted to the Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Ordered further, that the County Commissioners ascertain and report for their respective Counties to the Superintendent of Public Instruction, on or before the 15th day of December, 1868, as follows, viz:

1. The number of children between the ages of six and twenty-one years actually resident in each District, distinguishing between male and female, and color.
2. The number and condition of School Houses, and in whom the titles to said houses are vested.
3. The number of School Houses to be supplied in the County, (the minimum capacity to be accommodations for thirty pupils).
4. The number of Freedmen's Schools in each County, with estimated number of pupils in the same, and whether supported by the Freedmen's Bureau or otherwise.
5. The number of Select Schools in each County, with the estimated number of pupils in the same, and the monthly rate of tuition per scholar.
6. The number and condition of any High School or Academy buildings belonging to the town or city in which they may be located.

AN ACT

TO PUNISH BRIBERY AND COERCION IN ELECTIONS.

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person to offer any bribe to any of the qualified voters of this State with intent to influence his vote in any election.

Sec. 2. That it shall be unlawful for any person to attempt to influence the vote of any of the qualified voters of this State, in any election, by any threat to discharge such voter from employment or to withdraw from him patronage or to discharge from employment, or refuse patronage to any member of such voter's family.

Sec. 3. That it shall be unlawful for any person to give a pecuniary or other consideration whatever, to any of the qualified voters of this State because of the vote which such voter may cast or may have cast in any election.

Sec. 4. That it shall be unlawful for any person to discharge from employment, withdraw patronage from, or otherwise injure, threaten, oppress or attempt to intimidate any of the qualified voters of this State because of the vote such voter may cast in any election.

Sec. 5. That any person violating any of the provisions of this act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be liable to indictment for the same, and on conviction of having violated the provisions of section one, shall be fined not less than ten dollars, and on conviction of having violated the provisions of section two, shall be fined not less than fifty dollars, or imprisoned not less than twenty days.

Sec. 6. That every magistrate or peace officer of this State, or of municipal corporations in the State, who shall know of his own knowledge, or to whom information shall in any way come, that any person has violated any of the provisions of this act, shall immediately arrest, or by warrant cause to be arrested such person so offending, and upon sufficient evidence, shall cause him to enter into a bond and sufficient security in the sum of not less than two hundred dollars, for his appearance before the next term of the Superior Court of the County in which the offence may have been committed, then and there to answer to the law, and in the meantime to keep the peace, and in default of giving such bond and sufficient security, such person so offending, shall be committed to prison until he shall have complied with the aforesaid provisions.

Sec. 7. That any Justice of the Peace or other officer charged with the execution of this act, who shall refuse or neglect to carry out the provisions of said act, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor in office.

Sec. 8. This act shall be in force from and after its ratification.
