From New York.

NEW YORK, Oct. 10. - The Republicans of the Fifth Congressional District have nominated Horace Greeley for Congress.

From Washington.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10. - The President directs the Secretary of the Interior to restore to Louisiana the Statute of Washington, which was brought North by Gen. Butler.

From Baltimore.

BALTIMORE, Oct. 10. - In the cases of Woolley and of Kimberly Bros. vs. Butler on an application to vacate the warrants as a breach of Butler's Congressional privileges, Cushing for Butler and Merrick for the others argued all day. Argument continues next Saturday.

Foreign.

MADRID, Oct. 10. - The Provisional Junta issued a programme guaranteeing many reforms, including administrative decentralization, universal suffrage, religious liberty, freedom of the Press, the right of public assemblies, radical changes in the educational system, jury trials, and equality before the law.

Pushing the Financial Question.

Mr. Edward Atkinson, of Boston, is "pushing" the financial question with an ability and vigor that must be rather distressing to Mr. H. ratio Seymour, who urges his friends to push it in a very different direction. Mr. Atkinson has been studying documents accessible to every body, but by no means manageable by every body—such as reports of Secretaries of the Treasury—and has reached some very striking results.

For instance: The total revenue of the United States from April 1, 1861, to June 30, 1868, covers a quarter century of active war or of so-called peace, was \$2,213,849,498. If we deduct from the total expenditure for that time a fair allowance for ordinary peace expenses, we have, say, \$4,000,000,000 as the actual cost of the war. But as we owed on the 30th of June, 1868, only \$2,485,000,000, it follows that we have actually raised by taxation, and paid toward the cost of the war, besides paying all our peace expenses, \$1,515,000,000.

Again, as a taxation of nearly \$500,000,000 has proved too great for our present condition, the taxes have been reduced to but little more than \$300,000,000 a year—and such is the reducing of our expenses that this sum is ample to pay expenses and interest, and a moderate annual payment of the principal. The normal increase of the population will so enhance the revenue that the rate per capita, which now yields \$500,000,000, will in the next twenty years, increase the aggregate to a sum sufficient to pay all additional expenses and the entire principal of the debt within that time. The present tariff yields about \$170,000,000. The income tax yields \$300,000,000. The whisky and tobacco, stamp and other taxes will yield more than \$180,000,000.

This is the way to push the financial question—to tell the truth about it. To show that although the rebellion of the Southern wing of the Democratic party, sustained by the opposition offered to the Government by Mr. Seymour and his friends, has thrown a great debt upon the country, yet the energy and industry which conquered the rebellion will, with equal determination, easily pay the honest cost of the incalculably precious victory.—Harper's Weekly.
