THE CAMPAIGN IN THE STATE. We desire to call the special attention of our colored readers to the following article from the Goldsboro Messenger, which shows the position of the Democratic party on one of the vital issues of the present political contest, Negro Suffrage. We also give a brief article from the N. Y. Tribune showing the effort of one wing of the same party to delude the colored people into voting for their own disfranchisement. (The italics are our own.)

"The manner in which the campaign is being conducted in some portions of the State, if successful, will render a Republican defeat anything but a Democratic victory. The Democratic party is unalterably opposed to negro suffrage, and it is impossible to recede from this position without abandoning the contest. We cannot in any manner directly or indirectly, either by declaration or implication, admit the right of the negro to franchise, and lest it be hereafter charged upon us that we practiced a deception on the negro in this campaign, let us be plain and emphatic with him, so that he cannot possibly misunderstand our position.

"Some one has suggested that the prevalent one, that our success in this campaign depends upon the ability of the Democratic party to poll a large negro vote. This is an error, and one that is calculated to involve the party in trouble hereafter. Many of our canvassers magnify the importance of the negro vote, and are indiscreet and inconsistent enough to hold out inducements and make concessions which the party on the bound, heretofore repudiated. The fact is that we have no need of negro votes at the coming election, and in this sense the Democratic party does not want them. To be sure, we are at the South desirous that the old relations of friendship should continue to exist between the two races, and when an negro casts his vote with us we regard it as an asset of his determination and desire that these relations should not be disturbed. But we cannot solicit his vote. We should go with him over the political situation, and state unreservedly all the facts relative to the issues of the day, and warn him that the course of the Republican party in all things, the matter of suffrage in particular—leads to the destruction of the Government, and the consequent ruin of both races, and while denying his legal right to vote, exert whatever influence we have to induce him not to attempt the exercise of a privilege illegally conferred. This is the only consistent method by which to conduct the campaign, and since our politicians are bent on a policy, had this been adopted as the policy of the party, the canvass would have been rendered more effective, so far at least, as the negroes are concerned.

"The Democratic orators who are now carpet bagging through the Northern States, if they had an iota of honor, or the slightest care for party consistency, would resolutely hold their tongues about the sin and shame of Colored Suffrage. At least they would have ceased to importune the freedmen in behalf of Seymour and Blair. This they have just been doing, and that too officially, in Tennessee. For instance: The State Democratic Committee-men of that region are 'booming' and 'bellowing' again for the Colored Vote. They declare, in their addresses, that if the blacks will only vote for Blair they shall never be disturbed in any of their vested rights." They firmly declare that "there shall be no taxation without representation." They are fairly on their knees to "the freemen." This only proves what we have always maintained—that the freedman shall be the ballots as a weapon of defence; and it is this which Democratic Mr. Blair proposes to take away from him.—Tribune.
