anything but a Democratic victory. The Democratic party is unalterably opposed to negro suffrage, and it is impossible to recede from this position, without abandoning the contest. We cannot in any manner direct ly or indirectly, either by declaration or lm plication, admit the right of the negro to franchise, and lest it be hereafter charged upon us that we praticed a deception on the negro is this campaign, let us be plain and emphatic with him, so that he cannot possibly misunder

stand our position. Some one has attra data iden, and i fis a prevalent one, that our success in this compagn party to poll a large negro sore. This is an error, and one that is calculated to involve the party in trouble hereafter. The fact is that see have no need of nepr votes at the coming election, and in this sense the Democratic party does not want them-To be sure, we at the South desire that theeld relations of friendship should continue to esist between the two races, and when a negative casts his vote with us we regard it as an earest of his determination and desire that the relations shall not be disturbed. But my can not solicit his vote. We should go with him over the political situation, and state unreservedly all the facts relative to the issues of the day, and warn him that the course of the Republican party in all things- the matter of suf frage in particular-leads to the destruction of the Government, and the consequent rule of both races, and while denying his legal right to vote, exert whatever influence we have to induce him not to attempt the exercise of a privilege illegally conferred. This is the only consistent method by which to conduct the campaign, and since our politicians are so bent on a policy, had this been adopted as the policy of the party, the canvass would have been rendered more effective, so far at best, as the negroes are concerned " as the select
