JUSTICE'S COURT.—Before Justice Berry, G. G. Moye was arraigned on a charge of false arrest and imprisonment, preferred by Collins Moore. Mr. Moye is a Magistrate in James City, and caused the arrest of Campbell upon some charge that evidently not sustained and for which Campbell appeared to think there was no proper cause, hence the charge.

The case was ably argued by Mr. Washington for defendant and Messrs. Manly and Clark for the plaintiff. After a lengthy examination and a full hearing, Moye was bound over to await the action of the next term of the Superior Court.

ARREST.—Yesterday Deputy Sheriff Hancock arrested, on the Harper's plantation, Charles Hodges, on a charge of stealing and slaughtering hogs, the property of Mr. Cicero Green, and others living in the neighborhood. It appears that Hodges has been in the habit of raiding regularly on the pig stys of the people in his vicinity, and confiscating their porkers and selling the same. Suspicion has for some time rested upon him, and a trap was laid into which he readily fell. He is now safely lodged in the Craven street Hotel.

PROFITABLE PIG-RAISING.—Mr. Arthur Gaskins has in his possession a sow, pigged in October, 1849, which, for ten successive years littered ten pigs each year. For the past six years she has littered fifty-six pigs. She is now 19 years old, and has littered altogether one hundred and fifty-six pigs. At five dollars per pig, (a fair average,) she has raised seven hundred and eighty dollars worth of pork. Pretty good for one porker!
