### FULL RETURNS PROM THE STATE GRANT'S MAJORITY 11,478.

Every county has been heard from. The Republican majority in the seventyave counties from which official returns have been received in 12,466.

Of the remaining fourteen counties unofficial returns show that four have gone Republican by 1,168 majority, while the other ten have gone Democrat ie by 2,126 unifority. We think the official returns from these fourteen counties will be more favorable to the Republicans, but admitting the unofficial returns to be correct, the Republicanhave carried the old. ## RAILEOAD CONSOLIDATION

The subject of consolidating the Ar-LANTIC AND NORTH CAROLINA, and the NORTH CAROLINA RAILBOADS is one that has been of decided interest to a large portion of the people of the State for years past. The matter has undergone much discussion in times past and is likely to be agitated until the work in consumated.

As the impression is now general that all disturbing questions as to reconstruction are settled, all corporate and judicial interests are offered fresh incentives for awakening to new life. If consolidation in the case above referred to has heretofore been regarded as a matter of interest to the greater portion of the State, how much more vitally important is it now when there is palpable evidence that we are about to enter upon a new era in the development of our national resources. We are aware that some diversity of opinion exists in our own city of New Berne as to whether corsolidation will tend to our immediate benefit. When, however, we come to view the subject in a broader aspect and enquire whether it is better to encourage business and trade within the limits of in other States, there evidently exists no longer, any doubt, as to our true course. Whatever contributes to the revenues of our own State, developes our own resources and builds up onr own cities and towns, must be regarded a general benefit, reaching every locality within our State boundaries.

When the matter is fairly viewed it seems strange that this matter of consolidation has been so long delayed. It surely was the expectation when corporate priviledges were first given to the above named companies that consolidation would, sooner or later, occur. That it would prove a matter of great saving and economy upon the part of the State copy. to have these two important roads consolidated, there can searcely exist a doubt. It should be kept in mind, that By the Governor of North Carolina the interests of the State in these two roads predominates largely over all individual interests. The State is the owner of two-thirds of the stock in each of them, and has had, and in all probability for a long time to come, will have a controlling interest.
