County Commissioners met at the Court
House and transacted the usual routine of
business, passing several bills against the
County, &c.

The Board have decided to move the Reg-
ister's office from the Court House to the
brick office on Hancock street, now occupied
by E. R. Stanly, Esq. This is an excellent
idea, as the chances of destruction to the
county records by fire are lessened ninety per cent.
The records of the County should, properly,
be kept (if possible) in a fire-proof building,
and we hope that the funds of the County
may soon admit of a building of this kind be-
ing erected.
