## EDITORIAL BREVITIES.

Grant's official majority in Indiana is 10,145.

The snow on the plains, near Fort Davis, is two feet deep.

The total vote of Georgia officially returned is 159,000. Seymour's majority is 45,263.

The Prussian Diet has adopted a resolution in favor of entire freedom of debate, and it has been approved by the King.

General Garibaldi publishes a letter urging Spain to choose a Dictator for two years, and then to establish a Republic.

Rich discoveries of silver deposit are daily made in the White Pine region of Nevada. Notwithstanding the near approach of winter, miners are rushing to that region. The richness of the silver is incredible.

The official vote of New Hampshire for President is: Grant 37,718; Seymour 30,571; Grant's majority 7,147. The "Granite State" is always as sure for Right and Justice as are the foundations of her eternal hills.

The official canvass of the vote of Minnesota shows that Grant's majority is 16,540—a gain of 10,213, since last year. Equal suffrage has been carried by 9,416 majority. Minnesota deserves to be crowned queen of the Northwest.

The canvassing of the official vote of Ohio has just been completed. The total vote is 519,254, or 2,505 votes more than were cast in October. Grant has 280,122; Seymour 239,032. Grant's majority, 41,190. Grant's increase over October is 13,153; Seymour's decrease 10,630. No danger of repudiation by the "Buckeyes."

At the Evert's banquet in New York when the second regular toast was proposed, "The President elect," twenty-four miniature canons were discharged from a miniature fort erected at the side of the dining-room. This unexpected outburst called forth considerable admiration and merriment. Gen. Grant viewed it with astonishment and with a smile, and arose to respond to the toast just given. He responded as follows:

"GENTLEMEN OF THE BAR OF NEW YORK—I thank you very kindly for the manner in which you have received this 'toast,' which was intended as complimentary to myself. I may say there is no other community from which I could receive a demonstration of welcome with greater pleasure than from the citizens. I meet this evening." [Cheers.]

The official statement of the vote of Massachusetts in the late election is as follows: Grant, 134,579; Seymour, 59,103; Grant's majority 75,276. "God save the Commonwealth."

## TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

### FROM DIXIE VIEWS.

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 24.

H. E. Ross Pollock, editor of the *Atlanta Constitution*, was shot and killed this morning at 10 o'clock, while passing near his office, by James Tamm. The cause of the shooting was a publication in the *Opinion* reflecting on the character of General Grant's family.

The following are the particulars of the shooting this morning:

ment of the daughter of Wm. H. Tamm, a wealthy lumberman in this city. This morning about 10 o'clock, as H. E. Ross Pollock, editor of the paper, was near his office down corner of Peach and Forsyth streets, going to a hotel, a shot was fired from an upper window of a building opposite. Mr. Pollock fell dead, eleven bullet holes having passed through his body and one passing through his heart. The police searched the building and found James Tamm, a brother of the lady named, in it. He surrendered and was taken to the Marion House. A double-barreled gun, one barrel of which had been discharged, was found in the room.

The affair caused great excitement here, and a large crowd has gathered around the police office since its occurrence.
