CONSOLIDATION.

The history of the consolidation of Railway lines in other parts of our country, and the success which has resulted from it, should satisfy the present managers of the Atlantic & North Carolina, and North Carolina Railroad of the benefits that may be derived from the consolidation of these Roads. The same reasons assigned by the committee of the Board of Directors of the Va. & Tenn. R. R. can be urged here, viz: That the consolidation of these roads increases confidence and credit; greater efficiency in their management; better results as to income, and an enlarged accommodation to the public will be secured, and turn a portion of the freight business now passing over the Sea Board & Roanoke Railroad from the North to the Western towns of our State, by way of Raleigh, through Morehead or New Bern, and this plan we think practicable; for by the consolidation of the two roads, and having a through line without having to break bulk, and reduced tariffs, success must follow. We would suggest to the Board of Directors, at their next meeting, to discuss the consolidation policy, and if favorable, (and we see no reason why it should not be) draw up a petition to the General Assembly and have it acted upon at once, and then wake up from the Rip Van Winkleism, which, if it continues, and the road remains as an independent line, will only involve it in ruin and bankruptcy.

SPIDER SKIN.—Brother Caleb Luker, who resides in Black Rock, brought us, enclosed in a small box perforated with holes, a species of spider which he caught while cutting wood, north of the point of the West Mountain, and about three quarters of a mile up the mountain. His attraction was attracted by the spider's web, which was remarkable for its glossiness. He hunted for the spider and found it, singly encircled in a "nice house of silk"—as one. He took it home, put it in a box, and a few leaves with it; and it spun some silk of a light color, inside of which a large number of eggs were deposited; but from his forgetfulness to put fresh leaves in the box it died. The subject is worth inquiring into, for by the quantity of eggs in the box the spider must be prolific; and if it should be found to be more easily taken care of and attended than the regular silk-worm, it might be found profitable to obtain specimens and breed them. At any rate it would give a new variety of silk—*Salt Lake News*.
