LAND SALE.—Quite a crowd of people were
assembled at the Court House yesterday at
noon, drawn together by the sale, at auction,
of Evans's plantation, the Long Lake planta-
tion, and the well known tract of land now
occupied by James City. The bidding was
spirited in the Evans plantation; but the
interest centered on the James City tract. It
was announced that there was a mortgage of
\$1,167 on the place, which must be assumed
by the purchaser. The first bid was \$100 in
addition to the mortgage—from that by ad-
vances, now of \$5, and again of \$50, to the
bid, the contestants ran each other up to a
final bid of \$3,000, which, with the mortgage,
amounts to \$6,167, or nearly \$1 per acre. The
purchaser of all the real estate sold was
John Manning, Esq., of Chatham county,
who, we understand, holds heavy claims
against the Evans estate.

TERrible CASE OF DESTITUTION.—We
have had brought to our notice one of the
most terrible cases of destitution that has
ever been our province to become acquainted with. Mrs. Williams, a colored woman living
on South Front street, was discovered two or
three days ago in a fearful, destitute, and
starving condition. When discovered, she
was laying upon the floor of the hotel in
which she lives without any covering what-
ever, and surrounded by all the filth incident
to a condition of total inability to move one's self. She had been reduced to such a state for
want of sustenance that she was completely
powerless and reduced to a skeleton. She was
surrounded by three children who were in
a like condition.

This terrible case was brought to the atten-
tion of Col. Moore of the Bureau who im-
mediately went to the scene and found the
statement that he had heard in connection
with the matter but too true. He immediately
out of his private funds procured the necessary
food for the case and secured the attention
of a competent nurse, and in addition
supplied the family with sufficient food to
last them some time.

Notwithstanding the food, care, and attention
that Mrs. Williams has received since her
condition became known to Col. Moore, it
is feared, owing to exhausted condition
that she cannot live. She is being medically
attended by Dr. Fleming, of the Bureau, who
is doing all the medical treatment he can for
the relief of the sufferer, and it is on his opinion
that the belief exist that she cannot live. This
terrible case is a proof of the fact that
fearful suffering exists in this community,
and the appeals for aid can not be made too
loudly or urgently.

There is a Committee existing in our city,
composed of three Reverend gentlemen, and
some members of the Board of County Com-
missioners for the purpose of receiving aid
for the suffering of our community, and it is
the duty of all who can, to give.

Much credit in this particular case is due to
Col. Moore for his prompt and generous as-
sistance, and we hope that his action will be
very generally emulated. "Faith, Hope and
