THE NEW BERNE REPUBLICAN.

TO FURNISH BRIBERY AND CORRUPTION IN ELECTIONS.

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person to offer any bribe to any of the qualified voters of this State with intent to influence his vote in any election.

Section 2. That it shall be unlawful for any person to attempt to influence the vote of any of the qualified voters of this State, in any election, by any threat to discharge such voter from employment or to withdraw from him patronage, or to discharge from employment, or refuse patronage to any member of such voter's family.

Section 3. That it shall be unlawful for any person to give a pecuniary or other consideration whatever, to any of the qualified voters of this State because of the vote which such voter may cast or may have cast in any election.

Section 4. That it shall be unlawful for any person to discharge from employment, withdraw patronage from, or otherwise injure, threaten, oppress or attempt to intimidate any of the qualified voters of this State because of the vote such voter may cast in any election.

Section 5. That any person violating any of the provisions of this act shall be liable to indictment for the same, and on conviction of having violated the provisions of section one, shall be fined not less than twenty dollars, or imprisoned not less than ten days.

Section 6. That every magistrate or peace officer of this State, or of municipal corporations in the State, who shall know of his own knowledge, or to whom information shall in any way come, that any person has violated any of the provisions of this act, shall immediately arrest, or by warrant cause to be arrested, such person so offending, and upon sufficient evidence, shall cause him to enter into a bond and sufficient security in the sum of not less than two hundred dollars, for his appearance before the next term of the Superior Court of the County in which the offence may have been committed, then and there to answer to the law, and in the meantime to keep the peace, and in default of giving such bond and sufficient security, such person so offending, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor in office.

Section 7. That any Justice of the Peace or other officer charged with the execution of this act, who shall refuse or neglect to carry out the provisions of said act, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor in office.

Section 8. This act shall be in force from and after its ratification.

WE CAN'T SURRENDER NOW!

The struggle was too fierce and long. The cost in lives too dear. Nor yet forgotten are the braves. Who had so thought of fear? They could not see the old flag torn. From Freedom's hallowed brow. Nor can we lose what they bestowed. We can't surrender now!

OUR PLATFORM.

I. We congratulate the country on the assured success of the reconstruction policy of Congress, as evinced by the adoption, in the majority of the States lately in rebellion, of constitutions securing equal civil and political rights to all, and it is the duty of the Government to sustain those institutions and to prevent the people of such States from being readmitted to a state of anarchy. II. The guarantee by Congress of equal suffrage to all loyal men at the South was demanded by every consideration of public safety, of gratitude, and of justice, and must be maintained; while the question of suffrage in all the loyal States properly belongs to the people of those States. III. We denounce all forms of repudiation as a national crime; and the national honor requires the payment of the public indebtedness in the uttermost good faith to all creditors at home and abroad, not only according to the letter but the spirit of the laws under which it was contracted. IV. It is due to the labor of the nation that taxation should be equalized and reduced as rapidly as the national faith will permit. V. The national debt, contracted as it has been for the preservation of the Union, for all time to come, should be extended over a fair period for redemption, but it is the duty of Congress to reduce the rate of interest thereon whenever it can be honestly done. VI. That the best policy to diminish our burden of debt is to so improve our credit that capitalists will seek to loan us money at lower rates of interest than we now pay, and must continue to pay so long as it is the duty of Congress to reduce the rate of interest thereon whenever it can be honestly done. VII. The Government of the United States should be administered with the strictest economy, and the corruptions which have been so successfully nursed and fostered by Andrew Johnson should be eradicated. VIII. We profoundly deplore the animosity and tragic death of Abraham Lincoln, and regret the accession to the Presidency of Andrew Johnson, who has acted treacherously to the people who elected him and the cause he was pledged to support; who has usurped his high office and recede the laws; who has used his high office to induce other officers to ignore and violate the laws; who has employed his executive powers to render insecure the property, the peace, liberty and life, of the citizen; who has abused the pardoning power; who has denounced the National Legislature as unconstitutional; who has persistently and contemptuously resisted, by every means in his power, every proper attempt at the reconstruction of the States lately in rebellion; who has perverted the public patronage into an engine of wholesale corruption; and who has been justly impeached for high crimes and misdemeanors, and properly pronounced guilty thereof by the votes of thirty-five Senators. IX. The Doctrine of Great Britain and other European powers, that because a man is once a subject he is always so, must be resisted at every hazard by the United States, as a relic of feudal times, not authorized by the laws of nations, and at war with our national honor and independence. Naturalized citizens are entitled to protection in all their rights of citizenship, as though they were native-born; and no citizen of the United States, native or naturalized, must be liable to arrest and imprisonment by any foreign power for acts done or words spoken in this country; and if so arrested and imprisoned, it is the duty of the Government to interfere in his behalf. X. Of all who were faithful in the trials of the late war, there were none entitled to more especial honor than the brave soldiers and seamen who endured the hardships of campaign and cruise, and imperiled their lives in the service of the country; the bounty and pensions provided by the laws for these brave defenders of the nation are obligations never to be forgotten; the widows and orphans of the gallant dead are the wards of the people--a sacred legacy, bequeathed to the nation's protecting care. XI. Foreign immigration, which in the past has added so much to the wealth, development, and resources and increase of power of this Republic, the asylum of the oppressed of all nations, should be fostered and encouraged by a liberal and just policy. XII. This convention declares itself in sympathy with all oppressed peoples struggling for their rights. On motion of Carl Shurz, the following two phrases were added by a unanimous vote: Resolved, That we highly commend the spirit of magnanimity and forbearance with which men who have served in the rebellion--but who now frankly and honestly co-operate with us in restoring the peace of the country and reconstructing the Southern State governments upon the basis of impartial Justice and Equal Rights, are received back into the communion of the loyal people; and we favor the removal of the disabilities and restrictions imposed upon their late rebels in the same measure as their spirit of loyalty will direct, and as may be consistent with the safety of the loyal people. Resolved, That we recognize the great principles laid down in the immortal Declaration of Independence as the true foundation of democratic government; and we will with gladness, every effort toward making these principles a living reality on every inch of American soil.
