Sec. 1. *R is ordained* by the Mayor and Council of the city of New Bern, That for the fiscal year ending June 30th 1868, a tax of one per cent upon the value all of real estate within the limits of the corporation, be and the same is hereby laid to be collected as is by law provi-

ded. It is further ordained, That from and after the 1st day of April, 1868, no person, firm or corporation shall prosecute or carry on either of the trades or occupations mentioned in Section 6 of this ordinance, until he or they shall have obtained a license there for in the man-

It is further ordained, That every person or per-sons desiring to obtain a license shall register with the City Clerk, first; his name, or their name or style; se-cond, the trades or occupation for which a license is desired; third, the place where such trade or occupa-tion is to be carried on; fourth, if an inn-kceper, the yearly rental of the house and property to be occupied for said purpose, and thereupon, upon payment to the City Clerk, or other person authorized to collect the tax herein provided, shall make out and deliver a li-cense for such trade or occupation, which license shall continue in force for one month, at the place or premis-es described therein.
