## AN ORDINANCE To lay Taxes and Provide for the Support of the City Government.

Sec. 1. It is ordained by the Mayor and Council of the city of New Bern, That for the fiscal year ending June 30th 1869, a tax of one per cent upon the value of all real estate within the limits of the corporation, be and the same is hereby laid to be collected as is by law provided.  
It is further ordained, That from and after the 1st day of April, 1868, no person, firm or corporation shall prosecute or carry on either the trades or occupations mentioned in Section 2 of this ordinance, unless he or she shall have obtained a license therefor in the manner hereinafter provided.  
Sec. 2. It is further ordained, That every person or persons desiring to obtain a license shall register with the City Clerk, first, his name, or their name or style; second, the trade or occupation for which a license is desired; third, the place where such trade or occupation is to be carried on; fourth, if an inn-keeper, the ready rental of the house and property to be occupied for said purpose, and thereupon, upon payment to the City Clerk, or other person authorized to collect the tax herein provided for, of the amount of the license for such trade or occupation, which license shall continue in force for one month, at the place or premises described therein.  
Sec. 3. It is further ordained, That in every case where more than one of the pursuits, hereinafter described shall be carried on by the same person in the same place at the same time, except as therein men- tioned, license must be taken out for each, according to the rates severally prescribed.  
Sec. 4. And it is further ordained, That on and after the first day of April, 1868, for each license granted the sum herewith stated, shall be respectively and monthly paid. Any number of persons carrying on any business coming within the purview of this ordinance, in part- nership may transact such business at such place, under such license, and not otherwise.  
(1.) Bankers shall pay ten dollars for each license, and every person shall be deemed a banker within the mean- ing of this Ordinance, who keeps a place of business where credits are opened in favor of any person or firm, by the deposit or collection of money or currency, and the same, or any part thereof shall be paid out or remitted upon the draft or check of such creditor.  
(2.) Auctioneers, shall pay ten dollars for license.— Every person shall be deemed an auctioneer whose oc- cupation it is to offer property for sale to the highest bidder.  
(3.) Retail Dealers in liquors, including all distilled or fermented liquors, and whelies of every description, shall pay five dollars for each license. Every person who shall offer for sale such liquors in less quantity than one gallon at one time, to the same purchaser, shall be regarded a retail dealer in liquors.  
(4.) Retail Dealers shall pay one dollar for each license. Every person whose occupation it is to sell or offer for sale groceries or any goods, wares or merchandise, or foreign or domestic productions, in less quantities than a whole original piece or package, at one time to the same person (not including whelies, spirituous or malt liquors), shall be regarded as a retail dealer.  
(5.) Wholesale Dealers shall pay four dollars for each license. Every person whose occupation or business it is to sell groceries or any goods, wares or merchan- dises, by one or more original packages or pieces at one time, to the same purchaser, or wine and liquors in quantities of more than one gallon, shall be deemed a wholesale dealer.  
(6.) Hotels, Inns and Taverns, shall pay five dollars for each license. Every place where food and lodging are provided for and furnished to travelers or sojour- ners, in view of payment therefor, shall be regarded as a Hotel, Inn or Tavern.  
(7.) Brokers and Commission Merchants shall pay four dollars for each license. Any person except one holding a license as wholesale dealer or banker whose business it is to purchase or sell stocks, money, goods or merchandise, or seek orders therefor in original or unbroken packages, or produce, or to manage business matters for the owners of vessels, or consignors of freight, or shippers of machinery, or to purchase or sell real estate for others, shall be regarded as a Broker or Commission Merchant.  
(8.) Lawyers, Physicians, Dentists, Photographers and Printers, shall pay one dollar for each license.  
(9.) Express Companies shall pay five dollars for each license.  
(10.) Cart-houses shall pay two dollars for each li- cense.  
Sec. 7. And it is further ordained, That all Or- dinances and parts of Ordinances conflicting herewith, be, and the same are hereby repealed.

## OUR PLATFORM.

I. We congratulate the country on the as-  
sured success of the reconstruction policy of  
Congress, as evinced by the adoption in the  
majority of the States lately in rebellion, of  
Constitutions securing equal civil and political  
rights to all, and it is the duty of the Govern-  
ment to sustain these institutions and to pre-  
vent the people of such States from being re-  
admitted to a state of anarchy.  
II. The guarantee by Congress of equal  
suffrage to all loyal men at the South was de-  
manded by every consideration of public safety,  
of gratitude, and of justice, and must be  
maintained; while the question of suffrage in  
all the loyal States properly belongs to the peo-  
ple of those States.  
III. We denounce all forms of repudiation  
as a national crime; and the national honor  
requires the payment of the public indebted-  
ness in the utmost good faith to all credi-  
tors at home and abroad, not only according  
to the letter but the spirit of the laws under  
which it was contracted.  
IV. It is due to the labor of the nation  
that taxation should be equalized and reduced  
as rapidly as the national faith will permit.  
V. The national debt, contracted as it has  
been for the preservation of the Union for all  
time to come, should be extended over a fair  
period for redemption; and it is the duty of  
Congress to reduce the rate of interest there-  
on whenever it can be honestly done.  
VI. That the best policy to diminish our  
burden of debt is to so improve our credit that  
capitalists will seek to loan us money at lower  
rates of interest than we now pay, and must  
continue to pay so long as repudiation, partial  
or total, open or covert, is threatened or  
suspected.  
VII. The Government of the United States  
should be administered with the strictest econ-  
omy and the corruptions which have been so  
shamefully nursed and fostered by Andrew  
Johnson should be radically reformed.  
VIII. We profoundly deplore the untimely  
and tragic death of Abraham Lincoln, and  
regret the accession to the Presidency of An-  
drew Johnson, who has acted treacherously  
to the people who elected him and the cause  
he was pledged to support; who has usurped  
high legislative and judicial functions; who  
has refused to execute the laws; who has  
used his high office to induce other officers  
to ignore and violate the laws; who has em-  
ployed his executive powers to render insecure  
the property, the peace, liberty and life, of  
the citizen; who has abused the pardoning  
power; who has denounced the National Leg-  
islature as unconstitutional; who has persist-  
ently and corruptly resisted, by every means  
in his power, every proper attempt at the re-  
construction of the States lately in rebellion;  
who has perverted the public patronage into  
an engine of wholesale corruption; and who  
has been justly impeached for high crimes  
and misdemeanors, and properly pronounced  
guilty thereof by the votes of thirty-five Sen-  
ators.  
IX. The Doctrine of Great Britain and  
other European powers, that because a man  
is once a subject he is always so, must be re-  
sisted at every hazard by the United States,  
as a relic of feudal times, not authorized by  
the laws of nations, and at war with our na-  
tional honor and independence. Naturalized  
citizens are entitled to protection in all their  
rights of citizenship, as though they were  
native-born; and no citizen of the United  
States, native or naturalized, must be liable  
to arrest and imprisonment by any foreign  
power for acts done or words spoken in this  
country; and if so arrested and imprisoned,  
it is the duty of the Government to interfere  
in his behalf.  
X. Of all who were faithful in the trials of  
the late war, there were none entitled to more  
special honor than the brave soldiers and  
seamen who endured the hardships of cam-  
paign and cruise, and imperiled their lives in  
the service of the country; the bounties and  
pensions provided by the laws for these brave  
defenders of the nation are obligations never  
to be forgotten; the widows and orphans of  
the gallant dead are the wards of the people  
—a sacred legacy, bequeathed to the nation's  
protecting care.  
XI. Foreign immigration, which in the  
past has added so much to the wealth, develop-  
ment, and resources and increase of power  
to this Republic, the asylum of the oppressed  
of all nations, should be fostered and encour-  
aged by a liberal and just policy.  
XII. This convention declares itself in  
sympathy with all oppressed peoples strug-  
gling for their rights.  
On motion of Carl Shurz, the following two  
planks were added by a unanimous vote:  
Resolved, That we highly commend the  
spirit of magnanimity and forbearance with  
which men who have served in the rebellion  
—but who now frankly and honestly co-operate  
with us in restoring the peace of the country  
and reconstructing the Southern States  
governments upon the basis of Impartial Jus-  
tice and Equal Rights, are received back into  
the communion of the loyal people; and we  
favor the removal of the disqualifications and  
restrictions imposed upon the late rebels in  
the same measure as their spirit of loyalty  
will direct, and as may be consistent with  
the safety of the loyal people.  
Resolved, That we recognize the great prin-  
ciples laid down in the immortal Declaration  
of Independence as the true foundation of  
democratic government; and we hail with  
gladness every effort toward making these  
principles a living reality on every inch of  
American soil.

## AN ACT TO PUNISH BRIBERY AND CO- ERCION IN ELECTIONS.

To the General Assembly of North Carolina  
to enact:  
Section 1. That it shall be unlawful  
for any person to offer any bribe to any  
of the qualified voters of this State with  
intent to influence his vote in any elec-  
tion.  
Sec. 2. That it shall be unlawful for  
any person to attempt to influence the  
vote of any of the qualified voters of this  
State, in any election, by any threat to  
discharge such voter from employment  
or to withdraw from him patronage, or to  
discharge from employment, or refuse  
patronage to any member of such voter's  
family.  
Sec. 3. That it shall be unlawful for  
any person to give a pecuniary or other  
consideration whatever, to any of the  
qualified voters of this State because of  
the vote which such voter may cast or  
may have cast in any election.  
Sec. 4. That it shall be unlawful for  
any person to discharge from employ-  
ment, withdraw patronage from, or other-  
wise injure, threaten, oppress or attempt  
to intimidate any of the qualified voters  
of this State because of the vote such  
voter may cast in any election.  
Sec. 5. That any person violating any  
of the provisions of this act shall be  
liable to indictment for the same, and on  
conviction of having violated the provi-  
sions of section one, shall be fined not  
less than twenty dollars, or imprisoned  
not less than ten days. And on conviction  
of having violated the provisions of sec-  
tion two, shall be fined not less than fifty  
dollars, or imprisoned not less than twenty  
days. And on conviction of having violat-  
ed the provisions of section three, shall be  
fined not less than fifty dollars, and also  
imprisoned not less than twenty days.  
Sec. 6. That every magistrate or  
peace officer of this State, or of muni-  
cipal corporations in the State, who shall  
know of his own knowledge, or to whom  
information shall in any way come, that  
any person has violated any of the provi-  
sions of this act, shall immediately  
arrest, or by warrant cause to be arrested  
such person so offending; and upon  
sufficient evidence, shall cause him to  
enter into a bond and sufficient security  
in the sum of not less than two hundred  
dollars, for his appearance before the  
next term of the Superior Court of the  
County in which the offence may have  
been committed, then and there to answer  
to the law, and in the meantime to keep  
the peace, and in default of giving such  
bond and sufficient security, such person  
so offending, shall be committed to prison  
until he shall have complied with the  
aforesaid provisions.  
Sec. 7. That any Justice of the  
Peace or other officer charged with the  
execution of this act, who shall refuse  
or neglect to carry out the provisions  
of said act, shall be guilty of a misde-  
meanor in office.  
Sec. 8. This act shall be in force  
from and after its ratification.  
Ratified 24th day of August, 1868.
