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LEGISLATURE OF NORTH CAROLINA.

Mr. Brogden presented report of committee on Propositions and Grievances, recommending the passage of an act to prevent the sale of liquor within one and a half mile of the Company Shops. Mr. Osborne presented favorable report of joint committee of Conference relative to bill to amend an act concerning punishments. A message was received from the House announcing the passage of the following bills, and transmitting to the Senate.

Bill to legalize certain acts of late chairmen of County Courts. Pined first reading and referred to Committee on the Judiciary. Act to incorporate the Lebanon Lodge A. F. M. Passed second reading. Bill authorizing the holding of a special term of the Superior Court for the county of Craven.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

FRIDAY, DEC. 18, 1868.

The House met at 10 o'clock. On motion of Mr. Smith, of Wayne, the bill to legalize certain official acts of chairmen of the late county courts of the State passed its several readings under a suspension of the rules. Mr. Vest introduced a bill in relation to municipal elections, which passed its several readings under a suspension of the rules.

A message from the Senate transmitted several bills for consideration. On motion of Mr. Harris, of Wake, House bill No. 117, for the better protection of certain debtors, was considered under a suspension of the rules. Mr. Seymour's substitute was read as follows: The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact, That any sheriff or other officer, deputy or agent, who shall, under any warrant, expose to public sale, or take away so much of the property or estate of any debtor as is exempted from sale upon execution by the exemption laws in existence previous to the adoption of the present Constitution, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor.
