At last the contract for finishing the Hoosac Tunnel has been signed between the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, and Walter and Francis Stanley. This is the al road. contract as accepted by the State. The contractors agree to complete the tunnel N. C. The surprise of the fish and its captors and lay down 4 3-4 miles of substantial railway track through it, rated at \$14, 000 per mile, for \$4,592,000. They agree to begin operations at once, with energy, and by the 1st day of May next to deepen the central shaft 14 inches per day, and to advance from the east and west faces 250 feet per month. They engage to carry down the central shart to the base of the tunnel by May 1, 1870, and thereafter to advance from four faces the full-sized tunnel at the rate of 4,900 feet per year. At this rate of progress they would complete the enterprise in less than four years ; but, as a safeguard against all casualties, they are allowed a year more for the completion. They expeet, however, to finish the undertaking two years within the time prescribed by statute. The contractors give security in \$500,000 for the completion of the work on the terms prescribed, by stipulating that they will call for no money bales.
