GRAVEN COUNTY TOWNSHIPS.

The following are the Boundary Lines, established by the Board of County Commissioners, for the nine Townships, into which the County of Craven has been divided:

This division will be submitted to the Legislature, who will, without doubt, ratify and adopt it.

No. 1. Beginning on the Neuse River at the Pitt County line, and running along said line to the intersection of the Beaufort County line, thence along Beaufort County line to the road to Blount's Creek on said line, thence along said road to Little Swift Creek, thence along said creek to Big Swift Creek, thence down Big Swift Creek to Neuse river in the Pitt County line, the beginning.

No. 2. Beginning at the mouth of Big Swift Creek on Neuse river and running up Big Swift Creek to Little Swift Creek, thence down Little Swift Creek to Blount's Creek, thence along said road to Beaufort County line, thence along said road to Neuse river near Wilkinson's Point, thence up Neuse river to Big Swift Creek, the beginning.

No. 3. Beginning at the intersection of the Beaufort County line, and the old Pamlico road, and running along the Beaufort County line to the road to Jones' Bay, thence down Jones' Bay to Bay river, thence up Bay river to Bay Mills, thence up Bay river road to old Pamlico road, thence up said road to Beaufort County line, the beginning.

No. 4. Beginning at the intersection of the Bay river road and the old Pamlico road and running along the Bay river road to Bay river Mills, thence down Bay river to Pamlico Sound, thence along said sound to Neuse river, thence along and up Neuse river to old Pamlico road, thence up said road to the beginning.

No. 5. Beginning at the mouth of Hancock's Creek and running down Neuse river to Tar roghin Bay, thence up Tar roghin Bay to the Carteret County line, thence along said County line to Hancock's Creek, thence down said creek to the Neuse river, the beginning.

No. 6. Beginning at the mouth of Outer Creek and running down Neuse river to the mouth of Hancock's Creek, thence up said creek to the Carteret County line, thence along said County line to the West prong of Brice's Creek, thence down said Creek to the intersection of the Pollocksville road, thence along said road to the old Beaufort road, thence along and with said Beaufort road to Otter Creek, thence down said Creek to Neuse river the beginning.

No. 7. Beginning at the Jones County line on Trent river, and running down said river to Neuse river, thence down Neuse river to the mouth of Outer Creek, thence up Outer Creek to the Beaufort road, thence up said road to the Pollocksville road, thence along and with the Pollocksville road to Brice's Creek, thence up with Brice's Creek to the Jones County line, thence along said Creek to Trent river the beginning.

No. 8. Beginning at the mouth of Bachelor's Creek and running down said river to the
