PROCLAMATION.

An Act to Prevent the Sale of Intoxicating Liquors on the Day of Election.

The General Assembly of North Carolina, do enact:

Sec'y'n't: That no person or persons shall give away in any public place, retail or sell, except upon the prescription of a practicing physician and for medicinal purposes, any intoxicating liquor at any time within twelve hours next preceding or succeeding any public election, or during the holding thereof, at any place within five miles of any election precinct.

Sec'y'n't: That any person or persons violating the provisions of this Act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and punishable with a fine of not less than one thousand dollars.

Sec'y'n't: That this Act shall be in force from and after its ratification.
