That she was suspended is UTTERLY FALSE, and that she was in any way abused is wholly untrue.

While Mr. Settle assails the Hon. Z. B. Vance for whatever outrages were committed by the home guard, he is willing to defend the conduct of that class of men claiming loyalty to the Union...
