Our colleges are under the control of Trustees appointed for the expressed purpose of managing the affairs of their respective institutions having no claim on any other. Patton was chairman of the committee on Elucation and did not, of course, mention his school in his report, but while the report was under discussion, some member of the boly moved to amend the report by alding a line recommending 'Table Rock Seminsry." As far as the real owners of the property of the Seminary is concerned, I am satisfied that they desire a good school kept up there all the time, and with that view of the subject I have spoken favorably of the school wherever I hought it would accomplish any good. 


