CONGRESSIONAL CANVASS.
 A Raleigh special of Sept. 18 says: Charles R. Jones, independent candidate for Congress, is taking the bold and dangerous step of speaking against the present system of the county government. That is one matter which is absolutely essential in the maintenance of white supremacy in North Carolina. There has, of course, always been a feeling against it in the western counties and where negroes are few in numbers, but it is the one upon which the Democrats and the Republicans are in agreement. In so many of which the negroes are in overwhelming majority. This year the Democrats are too much at variance in labor questions, quarrelsome towards each other, and opponents, and all sorts of disappointed people both here and elsewhere here and there—and forget for the moment their only safeguard, the Democratic party. It shows a great and lamentable lack of consistency and devotion to the party.

CHINESE OUTRAGES.
 A Washington dispatch of September 17 says: Mr. Charles Doolittle, United States Minister to China, has reported to the State Department that two cases of outrages by Chinese on Americans have come to his knowledge.
 Rev. A. A. Fulton and wife and Miss Mary Fulton, M. D., all of the American Presbyterian mission in China, established in 1855 a medical mission hospital and mission station at Kwai Ping, about 490 miles southwest of Canton. On the 10th of last May the "foreign devils" came going there, and their buildings were destroyed. A crowd gathered, and Mr. Fulton started to get soldiers to protect the property, but was stoned and not permitted to leave the Yamen. On May 16th the mob piled straw and rags against the building occupied by Mrs. and Miss Fulton and a little daughter of Mrs. Fulton. The inmates fled, and the house was looted and burned. The ladies sought refuge on boats, but the mob threatened to destroy any boat that received them. After two hours the Fultons were all together in the Yamen, where they remained until May 18th, when they were taken to Canton. About six houses were destroyed and property to the value of \$5,500. The United States Consul was pressing the demand for damages.

DELEGATES WANTED.

 In every government, conducted and controlled by the people, political parties must exist—such parties are necessary. Some very good citizens deplore the existence of political parties and lament when they are pleased to term party strife, but it would seem that, however candid they may be, they have arrived at their conclusion either without reasoning or by a fallacious method of reasoning. Let us examine the matter with care, for and against, and see to what conclusion we are led by deliberate investigation and fair argument. The theory of our government is, that all political power is vested in and derived from the people. The sovereignty, if I might so term it, resides in the people in the aggregate. It follows, then, that an integral part of the power resides in every voter. The power to participate in the government carries with it the correlative duty of expressing that power prudently. It appears, then, that it is the duty of every citizen to assume the burdens of citizenship, and discharge his duty.
 But in what manner is this important duty to be discharged? The functions of government cannot be exercised by the people in mass, since they are in such large communities and scattered over a vast extent of territory; but our ancestors devised the only feasible plan of self-government in the system of electing persons as servants to represent the people, or as delegates to their will.

SEARED TO DEATH BY THE RECENT Earthquake.
 A Raleigh telegram of Sept. 18th says: Yesterday a negro boy arrived at Greensville and told a remarkable story, which bears evidence of truth. His home, he said, was at Penny Hill, Pitt county, and the night of the earthquake his father, mother, and himself were sleeping in that place. When the shock came his father became so badly frightened that he fainted and fell to the floor. This frightened his mother, and she, too, fainted and died in a few minutes. His father never regained consciousness, but died the following morning, lying longer in the locality with such fearful experience, and was looking for a new home.

Wiggins on the Earthquake.
 An Ottawa dispatch says Prof. E. Stone Wiggins, has submitted documentary and other proof to the Minister of Marine which shows that he predicted as far back as March of last year the earthquakes which are prevailing in the Ottawa. He also announced in the Ottawa Journal of May 13th, the approach of subterranean disturbances in the same locality. He also declares that the worst has not yet been reached, and claims that the greatest strain will be felt between this period and the middle of October, and that the Southern States will again be visited by earthquakes, and the disturbance will extend to California and South America.

Evansville, Indiana, experienced another earthquake shock on the morning of the 7th inst., which was much heavier than the one felt early in August.
 Prof. Heiman, of Evansville, says this city, as well as Charleston, is one of the centers for this earthquake business, and that between the 27th and 29th there will be two more shocks, both of which will be more severe than any yet experienced.
