COTTON GROWERS.

A Movement to Withhold From Market.

COLUMBIA, S. C., August 22.— Captain Richard O'Neal, of this city, in an open letter urges farmers of the South to entirely withhold half this year's cotton crop from market, and give notice to the world that no cotton will be produced next year. The subject is attracting attention in sub-Alliances and it is now under consideration to form a trust in county Alliances in whose hands one half the present crop will be placed, so as to assure its entire retirement from market.

It is pretty certain that something tending to overcome the inordinately bearish tone of the cotton market will be consummated by means of the Alliance.

Richland county Alliance to-day unanimously adopted resolutions calling upon cotton growers of Sorth Carolina to withhold onemird of the yield of the present crop from market.

HOW THE PRESIDENT IS PAID.


