Democracy Sweeps New York Both Ways from Harlem Bridge!

RUSSELL AND BOIES JOIN THE VICTORIOUS BAND!

Democracy Gains Everywhere!

Republicans Hold Only a Few Hairs of Campbell's Scalp After a Long and Bitter Fight!

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 4, '91.—Democrats in this city are jubilant to-day. Early this morning, just after midnight, when dispatches rolled in announcing Democratic gains everywhere, the booming of cannon could be heard. Republicans were trying to congratulate themselves over McKinley's victory in Ohio, but his majority being reduced every time news would be heard, they had little comfort in the face of a Waterloo in New York, defeat in Massachusetts and Iowa gubernatorial races, and reduced majorities everywhere else.

Up to the present hour it looks as if Flower's majority for Governor will reach 50,000. The rest of the democratic ticket is also elected. Ex-President Cleveland says it is a triumph of Democracy. The legislature is extremely close but chances in favor of the democrats. Great rejoicing prevails all over the State.

Iowa.
 Des Moines, Nov. 6th.—Yesterday democrats celebrated in great shape their victory in this State. Governor Boies, dem, is elected by six thousand plurality, and as it looks now it will take a careful vote to determine how the legislature and other state offices went. The farmers voted for Boies. His backers are shouting "Boies for President."

New Jersey.
 TRENTON, Nov. 6.—The Democrats will have a majority in both branches of the Legislature. At the political headquarters of the Democrats in this city claim is made that Democratic senators have been elected in Hudson, Hunterdon, Middlesex and Sussex counties. The Democrats also claim to have elected forty assemblymen in the State.

Virginia.
 RICHMOND, Va., Nov. 6, 1891.—The Lower House of the assembly contains seventy-seven democrats and five republicans so far heard from. Floyd county elected one of the Republicans of the House. Democrats have also elected nineteen senators. This means that Mrs. W. Daniel will be returned to the Senate.

 BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 6, '91.—The Baltimore News yesterday said: "The Democratic ticket of 1892, as suggested by yesterday's results, is undoubtedly Cleveland and Boies, one the exponent of the ideas of the old time Democracy of the older States, and the other the champion of the young Democracy of the Northwest."

CORNER STONE LAID OF A NEW CHURCH AT ROCKY FORD.
 KAPP'S MILLS, N. C., Nov. 6, '91.—To a correspondent had the pleasure of being present at the laying of the Corner Stone of the new church at Rocky Ford, near this place, on the 30th ult. The day was auspicious, being both warm and bright, and at an early hour the people began to arrive in wagons, buggies and carts, horseback and on foot, until some 800 or 1,000 people were on the grounds, a great number of whom were fair ladies from the surrounding country. We noticed in the audience people from Mount Airy, Elkin, Little Richmond, Trap Hill and Alleghany county and also from Virginia. At 1 o'clock p. m. the procession of Masons, under chief marshal Norman, proceeded to the church, where the Corner Stone was laid with the usual Masonic ceremonies, John R. Wolz, Esq., of Dobson Lodge, in the absence of Grand Master Gudgeon, being in charge. After a recess of 30 minutes, the crowd again assembled, when Rev. J. H. Lewellen delivered an eloquent address which was well suited to the occasion and well received by the audience. During recess an excellent dinner was set before the hungry visitors by the good citizens of the place. When completed, the building will be a large and imposing structure 30x60 feet and two-stories high and is intended for a three-fold purpose—church, school-room and Masonic Hall. Much credit is due the building committee, Messrs. Kapp, Thompson and Cockerham, for their promptness and energy in soliciting funds and letting the work to contract, and also to the contractor, Mr. H. B. Cockerham, for pushing the completion of the building at an early day, which is a necessity in the neighborhood. The large crowd was quiet and orderly, and the day will be long remembered by the people of Kapp's Mills. Rex.
