A LONG-WINDED TRIAL.

Spencer Taylor Arraigned Charged With Stealing Horses.

Many Witnesses Introduced by Both Sides—Lasts for a Week—Graves and Carter Appear for the Defense and Buxton and Sparger for the State.

A ridiculously long-winded trial. That was the verdict of every one who heard the trial of Spencer Taylor last week before Magistrates S. L. Gilmer, W. R. Bray and E. F. Wall.

Old man Taylor had been charged, as reported last week, with concealing horses stolen from Mr. C. W. Callaghan, of Newberry Mills, Wytke county, Va.

It was claimed by the prosecution that two bay horses were stolen from the stables of Mr. Callaghan on the night of Oct. 14th, and that that gentleman traced the course of the thief through Wytke, Montgomery, Floyd, Patrick and Carroll counties down the Fancy Gap road to a point west of Mount Airy.

That somewhere on or near the Blue Ridge the horses were taken in charge by one, Spencer Taylor, and were brought down the Fancy Gap road into Surry county.

Mr. Callaghan's friends from Virginia, went to the Little Mountains and sent him off to Wytke county jail. They then had Spencer Taylor arrested and placed in jail at this place.

The trial began on Tuesday October 27th and ended on last Tuesday night. Messrs. J. C. Buxton, of Winston, and Geo. W. Sparger, of Winston, for the State and Messrs. S. P. Graves and W. F. Carter for the defense. We wish we had space wherein to give the full evidence, but it was so long and tedious we refrain.

Crowds attended the trial day after day and it was one of the longest for a magistrate's court on record.

After hearing able and eloquent speeches from the attorneys on both sides the magistrates decided that there was a probable guilt of party arraigned and that he be committed to jail to await a requisition from the Governor.

At this point in the case, when the decision of the court was made, defendant's counsel read an affidavit signed by Mr. J. M. Fulton which stated that he (Mr. Fulton) had reason to believe that certain magistrates had expressed opinions before the evidence was all in. This raised quite a breeze. After the presentation of other affidavits which claimed newly discovered evidence, the court adjourned for the purpose of deciding on a question as to a new trial, and to report on Wednesday.

At the appointed hour the court assembled, and after the filing of a counter affidavit, announced that a new trial would be given on the ground of newly discovered evidence. The date of the new trial is December 1st.
