He is a bold and fearless democrat and is a close friend to Senator Gorman who opposed the force bill in the last Congress.

He was born in 1845, and comes of a prominent and wealthy family, his father (Stephen Brown) having been one of the largest planters in Carroll county, Maryland.

Governor-elect Brown is also a practical farmer and owns a three-thousand-acre plantation near Sykesville, Carroll county, where he is a breeder of superior cattle.

During Cleveland's Presidency he was Postmaster of Baltimore. He was also Treasurer of the Democratic Campaign Committee in 1885 and has served in the Maryland Legislature. He is a member of the Maryland and Jockey Clubs and is a man of social prominence and fashion.

A Husband Brutally Murders His Wife at Chestnut Yard, Va.

News reaches Mount Airy of a horrible crime that took place at Chestnut Yard, Carroll county, Virginia, on Thursday week.

On that afternoon John Weatherman had a quarrel with his wife which stirred up an old feud. After the quarrel had somewhat subsided, Weatherman went around the house, secured an axe and, slipping up behind his wife struck her on the head. After having knuckled her down he split her head wide open.

The brute went and confessed his crime to an officer in the neighborhood who carried him to Hillsville and lodged him in jail. That community is considerably shocked over the horrible affair.

ANOTHER ACCOUNT.
(From Pulaski News.)
About ten minutes before the passenger train reached Chestnut Yard Thursday afternoon a most atrocious murder was committed. John Weatherman, a worthless white man, dealing his wife three fearful blows on the back of the head with an axe. Death resulted in a half hour.

Two little children saw their father's belshish work and their grief was pitiable to see. Two other children were at school.

Weatherman has been a drinking character, and recently he became so dangerously abusive that his wife swore out a peace warrant. He couldn't give the necessary bond and was committed to jail. His wife couldn't bear to have her husband in durance vile, and she soon raised money from some property of her own and secured his release. He had only been out of jail about a month.

After murdering the woman Weatherman walked down to the railroad station and coolly told of the crime.

Constable James Jones arrested the villain and took him to Hillsville jail securely bound.

Carolina and Virginia News Packed in Paragraphs.

Efforts and Energies, Incidents and Achievements.

Burglars are at work in Winston. Three new leaf factories for Tarboro this season.

This is the last week of the Great Southern Exposition at Raleigh. It has proven a success.

Citizens of Norfolk held a mass-meeting to express gratification at settlement of the State debt.

The Odd Fellows orphange at Goldsboro received \$600 from the Exposition managers at Raleigh.

Interest is being manifested in the trial of A. McDougald at Fayetteville for the murder of his uncle Mr. Conoly.

The loss by the burning of the Presbyterian Orphange at Barium Springs is put at \$6,000 with insurance at \$3,000.

B. B. Turner has announced himself as Alliance candidate to succeed the late Gen. Lee of the eighth Virginia district in Congress.

There are over 200 cases docketed for the next term of Forsyth Superior Court which will be presided over by Judge J. F. Graves.

The new town of North Wilkesboro, N. C. has organized a bank with Mr. J. E. Finley as President and D. W. Greenleaf as Cashier.

Governor Wm. E. Russell, of Massachusetts, the young democratic champion, visited the Norfolk, Va., navy yard on last Friday.

Hon. Chas. W. McClammy, ex-Congressman from the third North Carolina district, is a candidate for Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives.

The internal revenue report of the Fourth North Carolina District shows that in that district there are 66 plug tobacco factories, 4 cigar and 3 cigarette factories.

Rocky Mount warehouse men are bending every effort to have the greatest sales yet seen in Eastern North Carolina at the Exposition to be held there on Dec. 2nd.

Last Friday at Raleigh a State Temperance Association was organized for the purpose of helping to subdue the liquor traffic. Mr. N. B. Dringhouse was elected president.

The mail-carrier on the route between Jefferson, Ashe Co., N. C., and Independence, Va., has been arrested charged with robbing the mails. He admits having assisted a party in robbing a pouch.

Madison and Leaksville, N. C., are markets that expect to sell two million pounds each in '91 and '92. Wilcox expects to sell five, Bedford City one and a half, Florence, S. C. one and a half, Warrenton, two; Rocky Mount five; Tarboro two; Mount Airy three and a half, Danville thirty five, Richmond ten, Winston twenty five and Henderson nine million pounds of the leaf this season.

Revenue raiders captured 150 gallons of blockade whiskey in Yadkin county last Thursday and carried the prisoners and all to Winston. That night the prisoners got loose, stole their horses and fled for parts unknown.

Rev. R. S. Bingham, a Methodist minister who lives near Emory and Henry College, Va., surrendered himself on last Thursday, saying he shot Frank Queensberry during a quarrel. He claims that the shooting was done in self defense and after Queensberry had assaulted him. The injured man, it is said, will die.

A fire starting in Bachrach's shoe store in Rossmore, Va., on Salem Avenue last Thursday resulted in the following losses: Bachrach's shoe store, \$11,500, insurance \$4,500; Philadelphia clothing house, \$8,000, covered by insurance; M. H. Jenny's fruit store, \$500, covered by insurance; damage to buildings \$3,000, insurance \$1,000.

A valuable discovery of iron ore has just been made in Ashe county in the shape of specular iron ore near Pond Mountain. The veins in a hill some 200 hundred feet in height and shows itself the whole length of the hill. The discovery has created considerable excitement among iron men, as it is the largest and most extensive vein ever found in the United States, and is considered very valuable on account of the nature of the metal in making a high grade of steel.

COL. POLK RE-ELECTED.

The Farmers Alliance Chooses Him Again as Their Leader.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 20. This morning's session of the National Alliance was a very quiet one. Much business of routine character was disposed of. A great number of resolutions proposing constitutional and platform changes were referred to different committees. They all emanated from State Alliances and among them was one from the Virginia State Alliance introduced by J. B. Beverly, of Virginia, demanding an amendment to the national constitution which would provide for disfranchisement of Federal office holders. The object of the demand is to destroy the influence of party schismery.

M'ALLISTER ISSUES A CALL.
W. S. McAllister, of the anti-sub treasury Alliance executive committee, this morning issued a call for a national convention of anti-sub treasury Alliancemen to be held at Memphis, Tenn., on December 16. This is the first move to organize an opposition to the Alliance of the F. M. B. A. and People's party, and is the direct result of the refusal of the Alliance to bear the protest of the McAllister faction.

NO FORMAL INDORSEMENT.
The course of all the parties for the future has become well defined. There will be no formal indorsement or co-operation between the Alliance and F. M. B. A., and the People's party.

IGNATIUS DONNELLY SPOKE.
The executive committee of the People's party was in session this morning and Ignatius Donnelly spoke for a long time, and the committee, upon his advice, decided not to push its demands for indorsement at this time. The committee thinks that at the convention of the party next summer a platform can be built that will serve the common political purposes of every industrial organization in the country.

WHAT JERRY SAYS.
Jerry Simpson says consolidation of all interests will be the dire results of the confederated unions' conference next February and that it is in this the People's party claims its support.

REPRESENTS 4,000,000 VOTES.
The party managers claim that their enunciated principles and avowed purposes represent the combined efforts of four million votes. The removal of the probability of a fight upon the third party question in the Alliance council leaves that body with but little business on its hands of public importance.

ANTI-SUB-TREASURY ALLIANCE.
The National Alliance having rejected the overture of the anti-sub treasury men, the executive committee of the anti-sub treasury party will proceed to Texas, where 127 sub-Alliances have already declared against the sub treasury scheme, and will begin the work of organizing a new Alliance.

THE FEBRUARY MEETING.
It was decided at a meeting of the committee on confederation of the various industrial organizations yesterday that a great convention, composed of delegates from all the different organizations, shall meet at some point in the Central States, February 2d, to consider the question of political action. When the assembly convenes it will proceed to draw up a platform of declarations and demands, and the two great political parties will be required to give them consideration and endorsement. It is not expected by any one that the great parties will take any notice of these demands, and the way will remain clear for the People's party to call a convention after the other political conventions have been held and adopt the formulated demands of the confederated labor assembly as its platform. This is the plan of action now determined upon by the People's party.

THE CONVENTION AIMS FOR THE CONSOLIDATION OF ALL THE LABORING CLASSES and will be composed of twenty-five delegates-at-large from each confederated organization, and one delegate for each 10,000, or fraction thereof of members.

THE NEW OFFICERS.
President Polk was unanimously re-elected, and J. H. Louks, of South Dakota, was chosen vice-president. J. H. Turner was re-elected secretary-treasurer, and J. F. Willis, of Kansas, national lecturer.

PEOPLE'S PARTY JUBILANT.
Mr. George F. Washburn, of the executive committee of the People's party, stated that the leaders of that party were jubilant over the election of President Polk. Of the four great leaders in the Alliance, Messrs. Livingstone, Macune, Terrell and Polk, the latter was regarded as the one favorable to independent political action.

THE WORLD TRAVERSED.

National and Foreign News of Interest to Many.

What has Happened in the Old and New Worlds since the News Last Greeted Its Readers.

The Pope of Rome complains of declining health, and speaks of his death as not being far distant.

There is danger of a bloody revolution in Mexico which might submerge the whole country in blood.

Three little children were devoured by wolves near St. Paul, Minnesota, on last week. There were 125 wolves in the pack.

The first National Mining Congress, which has been in session in Denver, Col., adopted a resolution calling for free and unlimited coinage of silver.

Peter Jackson, the colored pugilist, has signed an agreement to fight Slav in under the auspices of the National club in London for a purse of \$10,000.

A water main burst in an excavation at Brooklyn where workmen were employed; no one escaped; three dead were recovered, and three others are still buried.

New York papers say that flowers were in bloom in the gardens of that town as late as the 10th inst. This is one of the years that Flowers had a pretty good run in New York.

There were thirty thousand people to witness the Yale boys defeat the Harvard boys on the Springfield, Mass., football field on last Saturday—score: Yale 10, Harvard 0.

The Earl of Dudley carries the largest life insurance in the world, amounting to \$6,000,000. Postmaster General Wanamaker carries \$1,500,000, which is said to be the largest amount carried by any citizen of the United States.

VEST FOR CLEVELAND.
Silver Men Will Support the Executive—Tariff Reform the Issue.

In an interview in St. Louis, Senator Vest, who is one of the recognized exponents of the free-silver sentiment, is quoted as saying that the Democratic ticket in 1892 will be "Cleveland and Blaine or Cleveland and Gray, but always Cleveland. I anticipate your next question and will answer it now. You want to know how silver Democrats like myself will stand as to his candidacy. We will support him earnestly and loyally, for we have him to be wrong, but honestly wrong, and he has as much right to his opinion as we have to ours. The views of any Democrat as to free coinage constitute no test of party fealty, for our party in national convention has never so declared.

"Above all, however, and this is with me conclusive, Mr. Cleveland can be elected on the issue of tariff reform, and I regard the defeat of the Republican party at the next election as the greatest possible good for the country. Every Democrat should be willing to postpone the silver question if it be necessary to prevent Republican success. We can take up the question of free coinage hereafter, if power can be wrested from the Republicans, but it that party wins again, the force bill will be enacted into law, and free popular elections will never again be had in t's country.

"I regard the measure as the most arbitrary, oppressive and inflexible ever proposed by any party. Its object was to put the election, or rather selection of Congressman and presidential electors for every State in the hands of three partisan chosen for the work. The Republican leaders have never abandoned the hope of passing this bill. They were defeated in the Senate by the free coinage Republicans, but they relinquished their grasp sullenly and reluctantly.

"When I opened the canvass in this city last fall I stated that, no matter what the result of the November elections of that year, the Republicans would press the force bill to a passage. We carried the elections, but the result had no effect on the Republican leaders, and afterward came the exhaustive struggle in the Senate, which has passed into history, and now, although they have no hope, with a Democratic House, of enacting the law, if we should lose the next presidential election and the House of Representatives, the force bill would be the first measure passed by the Republicans. Especially would the election of Harrison mean this, for his whole heart was in the enactment of this iniquitous law. He used every means in his power to pass the bill through the Senate, and was the most unhappy man in Washington when it failed.

"I believe that Mr. Cleveland can carry New York, Indiana, Connecticut and New Jersey, and this insures his election. He is stronger in New York than ever before, while in the whole country the people have full confidence in his courage, ability and honesty."
