Vote for the graded school.

Do not be content to simply vote for the graded school. Work for it with all your might.

Good roads to the mountains would increase the trade of Mount Airy considerably.

A graded school will benefit every person in town, the well-to-do as well as the poor. Vote for it and work for it.

With a graded school here there will be a greater demand for farms accessible to the school and lands will increase in value.

What Mount Airy needs, among other things, is to be well advertised. Nothing has been done along this line in four or five years.

Another issue of bonds to the amount of \$66,000,000, will be made in a few days for the purpose of replenishing the depleted reserve fund.

Ex Queen Liloukalani has relinquished all claims to the throne of Hawaii and advises all her friends and followers to submit to the new government. It is now thought that she will be banished from the island.

We should make an effort to get more trade from Stokes, Alleghany and Ashe counties and from the adjoining counties of Virginia. We should not be content with merely holding the trade we have; we should be occupying new territory every year.

Col. Julian S. Carr has given ten thousand dollars to the American University to be erected at Washington. Colonel Carr, of course has the right to do as he pleases with his money, but it does not seem right for him to send it North where most of the money of the country is already centered and where it is really not needed. That amount of money given to some North Carolina institution would do twice the good that it will do at the North.

The Republicans in the State Senate by voting for the resolution instructing North Carolina representatives in Congress to vote for the free coinage of silver at the ratio of 16 to 1 and for the increase of the per capita circulation of money to \$50, have placed themselves squarely on the Populist platform and directly antagonistic to the national Republican platform. This is bordering very closely on Populism. It is said that the Republicans in the North and West are beginning to regard the party in this State with very grave suspicion. We believe many of the Republican leaders in this State will abandon the party rather than give up the offices they hold, which they would have to do if they did not keep on good terms with the Populists.

LEGISLATIVE NEWS.

A large number of new bills were introduced in the Legislature last week, the following being the most important: To amend the insurance law that an appeal from a State to a Federal court by a company shall cause forfeiture of charter; to add \$5,000 to the annual appropriation for the Colored Agricultural and Mechanical College at Greensboro; to forbid any State officer from travelling on a free pass; to pay solicitors salaries; to make it a crime for a person in this State to injure a person in other States. (This is to cure a defect in the Constitution.) A man standing in this State killed one in Tennessee, yet cannot be punished in either State. Other bills were: To incorporate a North Carolina Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children; to repeal the act appropriating \$10,000 annually to the Oxford Orphan Asylum.

Bills abolishing the death penalty and to establish courts of oyer and terminer were tabled.

The Senate session Thursday was brief, and was devoted mainly to the discussion of a bill to reduce the salaries of the railway commissioners from \$2,000 to \$1,500. The Democrats and a few Republicans antagonized this bill, but it was passed by a vote of 32 to 7. No reason for the passage of such a bill was given. It is the first strike at salaries this session. Some of the Populists exulted at the reduction. A committee on retrenchment and reform was appointed, with Senator Paddison as chairman.

A bill was passed to amend the code for civil procedure so as to permit title to office to be tried without consent of the Attorney-General, the contestant to sue in forma pauperis, and the State not to be liable for costs.

The Senate committee agreed to favorably report the bill appropriating \$2,500 for the Lindley Training School for young females. The bill to lend the Confederate Monument Association from the direct tax fund an amount not to exceed \$10,000, for the purpose of completing the payment for the monument was discussed before the Senate Judiciary Committee this evening, and many ladies were present. The committee agreed to make a favorable report.

A bill has been prepared to amend the charter of Wilmington as to leave the Democrats in control of the Board of Audit and Finance, and turn all the other offices over to the Republicans.

In the Senate Friday the resolution to instruct our Senators and Representatives to vote for the free and unlimited coinage of silver at a ratio of 16 to 1 came up.

Senator Cook moved to amend, restricting the silver to the United States—lost.

Senator Moody, of Haywood, moved to refer.

This precipitated a long discussion, participated in by Senators Dowd, Cook, Rice, Moody of Haywood and Fowler.

Senator Dowd in his speech was much interrupted by questions. In reply to a question he asked Senator Rice to what body he belonged any way.

Senator Rice replied he was a Republican.

Senator Dowd answered that he was glad he knew what he was; for he was unable to tell before as he had got so mixed up with the Populists; so he assumed he was a cross standard man. There was a cross fire between him and Senator Moody, of Haywood, relative to the record of the Republican and Democratic parties. Senator Moody making several allusions to the present Congress and Grover Cleveland's policy.

Senator Mewborne then moved to amend (the amendment being the Populist platform demand—the sub treasury plan—free coinage 16 to 1 and that the circulating medium be increased at least \$50 per capita exclusive of legal reserves.)

Senator Moody's motion to refer was lost—16 to 25.

The question then recurred on the substitute or amendment of Senator Mewborne and it was adopted—aye, 25; noes, 15. Many Senators explained their votes and much amusement was created when Senator Fortune admitted that "this matter had put him in a hole."

The Cook amendment was then voted on and lost, ayes, 9; noes, 29.

The resolution as amended by Senator Mewborne passed its second and third readings.

The caucus committee has adopted the new election law as drawn by Spier Whitaker, counsel for the special steering committee. Great care was given to the preparation of this bill. Here are all its principal features.

Two boxes and two ballots. One ballot contains the names of State officers, justices and judges and Congressmen. The other box is for all other officers. Registrars of elections are appointed by the clerk of the court, one from each political party. Poll-holders are appointed in the same way. Both registrars and poll-holders are nominated by State chairmen of each political party. The bill defines as a political party one which in the last election for Governor and other State officers received 30,000 votes and thus recognizes three parties in this State. There will be two messengers sent from each polling place as soon as the returns are made out. One of these takes the returns to the register of deeds, the other messenger takes them to the clerk of court. The returns must be so received by the clerk and register within twenty-four hours after they are prepared and receipts for them must be given to the messengers. The polls are to close at the usual time—sunset. As soon as the ballots are counted they are replaced

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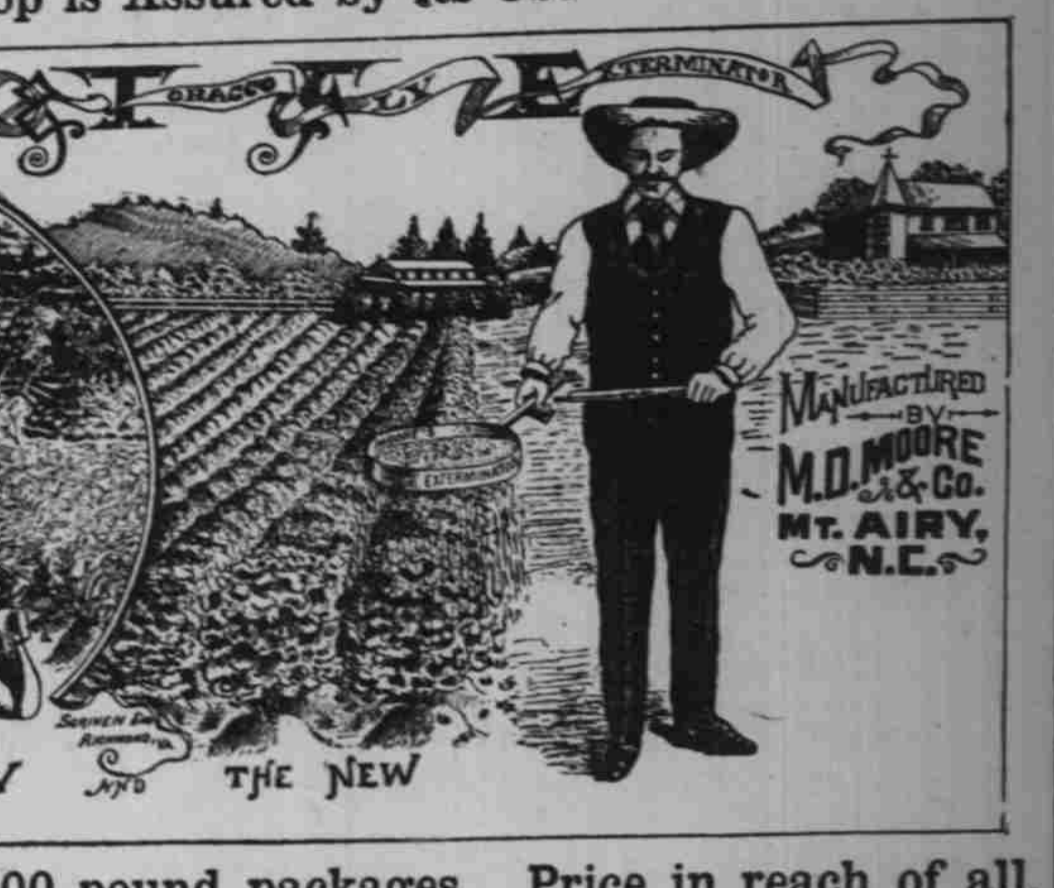
