THE GOVERNMENT OF HER'TFORD ACADEMY. AT MURFREESBOROUGH,

Agreed upon, by the Board of Trustees. on the 26th day of Sept. A. D. 1812. ARTICLE I.

OF ADMISSIONS.

SEC. 1. The quarters shall be considered as commencing on the first days of January, April, July. and October; and no scholar shall enter for a shorter period than one quarter: Provided, that when scholars offer from a dist mce, after the quarters have commenced; the treasurer may be authorised to receive for such quarter; such sum as may to him seem reasonable.

SEC. 2. Every student shall, at the time of admission, pay one quarter's tuition in advance, and produce to the Principal a certificate of his or her admission.

SEC. 3. The terms of tuition shall be, for Spelling and Reading, four dollars, for Reading, Writing, Arithmetick, English Grammar, and the Elements of Geography five dollars, for the Languages, Mathematicks, use of the Globes and general Geography, Natural Philosophy and Logick six dollars per quarter. GOVERNMENT OF THE STUDENTS WITHIN THE ACADEMY.

SEC. 1. From the first day of April until the first day of October, attendance will be required from the ringing of the bell, at sunrise, until dismissed for breakfast; again from 8 A. M. until 12, and from 2 P. M. until 6.-From the first of October until the first of Aprilfrom 6 in the morning until breakfast, and from 9 until 12-in the afternoon from 2 until 5 .- No attendance will be required on Saturdays, except by the higher classes, who exhibit composition.

SEC. 2. At the ringing of the bel the students shall repair, in a decent and orderly manner to their respective seats; after which, all conversation, whispering, and improper gestures shall cease, and diligent attention to their various duties and employments shall be required.

SEC. 3. No student shall take from the desk or apartment of another student, any article without permission.

SEC. 4. A monitor shall be appointed weekly from the senior classes, in each apartment, who shall notice all absences, offences and indecorums, and report them to the Preceptors.

ARTICLE III.

EXERCISE AND STUDIES.

SEC. 1. The academy shall be pened and closed, morning and vening, by reading a portion of the Holy Scriptures, and by prayerduring which the students shall behave with strict decorum, and shall be provided with Bibles to look over the portion read.

SEC. 2. The branches of learning taught in the academy, shall be Reading, Writing, Spelling, Elocuion, English Grammar, Arithmeick, Geography with the use of the Globes, Rhetorick, Logick, Mathematicks, Natural Philosophy,

ARTICLE V. PUNISHMENTS.
