STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA, CRAVEN COUNTY.

WHEREAS, complaint hath been made to us, two of the Justices of the Peace for the County aforesaid, by JOHN ALLEN, Esq. that two Negro Slaves, one a man about twenty seven years of age named Primus, about five feet nine inches high, Country born, a very artful and sensible fellow, the other a Boy, about sixteen years of age, tall, and of a yellow complexion, Country born, named Toney, have absented themselves from their said Master's service, and continue lurking about, committing acts of felony.

THESE are therefore in the name of the State to command the SHERIFF of Craven County, to make diligent search and enquiry after the said outlying Slaves, and them to apprehend according to Law. And we do further notify that unless the said outlying Slaves, Primus, and Toney, do immediately after the date of these presents surrender themselves, that it shall and may be lawful for any person or persons to kill and destroy the said outlying Slaves without any impeachment of crime for so doing.

LONDON

Extract of a letter from Lisbon, March 16.

One of the Queen's ships from Fernambuco, is arrived here. She, on that coast, on the first instant, fell in with a Spanish ship, Le Princippi, S. Larunzo, coming from Monte Videa, which soon after sunk with 70,000 hides, &c. but the Portuguese vessel saved all the crew, consisting of 84 persons, with the treasure amounting, it is said, to near four millions of piafters.

A report is current in Scotland, that all the Dukes of Scotland are to be made Peers of Great Britain.

April 17. His Majesty is said to be a warm advocate for triennial Parliaments ever since the late oligarchal attempt to seize the executive government. For short Parliaments will certainly, says he, give the people a power of punishing their representatives, if guilty; by expulsion, and prevent party rising to any dangerous height, to the prejudice of either the people's privileges or his own prerogative.

APRIL 22d.

Accounts were last night received at the Secretary of State's Office from the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, of a very alarming nature, a dangerous insurrection has taken place in Dublin, and the Duke of Rutland has been much insulted in his efforts to quell the tumult.

May 1. An express arrived at eight o'clock yesterday evening from Ireland of an alarming nature. The Volunteers will not permit the liberty of the press to be destroyed, The duke presses an immediate recall.

AMERICAN NEWS.

Philadelphia, June 19.

THIS day the ship St. James, Captaint Cain, sailed for Europe, with whom goes passenger his Excellency the Chevalier De LA LUZERNE, who has for several years resided in this city, in the exalted station of Minister Plenipotentiary from the Court of Versailles. His amiable deportment, during his residence in this country, has endeared him to every class of citizens, and his departure is universally regretted.

RICHMOND, July 3.

We are informed from the back settlements, that a number of robbers have been discovered about the Ohio, who rob the inhabitants of cattle, negroes, and any thing they can lay their hands on. I've been informed that two wounded and taken, and have discovered their number to be about five.
