(NORTH CAROLINA AND SOUTH CABOLINA.)
COLUMBIA, S. C., March 21, 1867. GENERAL ORDER

"1. In compliance with General orders No. 10, Healquarters of the Army, March 11th, 1867, the Second Military District constituted by the Act of Congress, Public No. 68, 21 Murch, 1867, entitled "An Act for the more efficient government of the rebel States." "11. In the execution of the duty of the Com

manding General to maintain the security of the inhabitants in their persons and property, to sup-press insurrection, disorder and violence, and to punish or cause to be punished all disturbers of the public peace and criminals, the local civil tribunals will be permitted to take jurisdiction of and try off-inders, excepting only such cases as may by the order of the commanding General be referred to a commission or other military tribu-

nal for trial.

"III The civil government now existing in
North Carolina and South Carolina is provisional only, and in all respects subject to the paramount authority of the United States, at any time to abolish, modify, control or supercede the same. Local laws and municipal regulations not inconistent with the Constitution and laws of the Uni ted States, or the proclamations of the President, or with such regulations as are or may be pre-scribed in the orders of the Commanding Genera', are hereby declared to be in force; and, in conformity therewith, civil officers are hereby authorized to continue the exercise of their proper func-tions, and will be respected and obeyed by the inhab tants.

"IV. Whenever any civil officer, magi strate or court, neglects or refuses to perform an official act properly required of such tribunal or officer, whereby due and rightful security to person or property shall be defined, the case will be reported by the Post Commander to these Headquar-
