Gold News.

The following statement, in regard to the gelden country, has been compiled from the most authentic sources, from men who are recently from the diggirgs, and from those who have been engaged prospecting over the whole of that interesting region:

The Sacramento still yields a good dividend of something like ten to fif.cen dollars a day to all industrious laborers, and a bar ner where the gold was first discovered, which had been entirely overlooked by the engerness of new adventucers, has been wrought with great success, something like an average of two bundred dollars each, to a party of three, for some two weeks past. The new method of turning the river and of working in its drained channel has not always repaid the effort, yet, in enough cases, it has succeeded to make it quite popular. It requires a union of some twenty to sixty to build the dam. The one at Mormon Island has not as yet reached the expectation of its friends, though the shares of the stock has been sold here fifty per cent above par.

The Feather River, where the finest gold has been found, is yet a favorite stream among the diggers. It yields the average of an ounce per man, if he works well. The lazy and inactive in this country do not fare any better here than in any other, and the dissitated are often the earliest victims to the diseases of the climate. But hard labor is well rewarded by the bountiful hand of Nature .-About 3,000 persons are now engaged there.

The Ayaba River is said to be the surest place for making money by those who stick to one spot, and the Indian trade is brisk -A friend of ours assured us that he had sold common scarlet blankets at from four to ten cunces spiece. At the present time he has all endy realized a few thousands by his mercamile shrewdness.

Of the three forks of the Rio de los Amer i ance, the North has now a majority of miners. The gold is of a light temon color, and when assayed is found to possess a greater quantity of silver than that of the neighboring streams. Many have left the Middle Fork in parties, for the mountain sour es of thes precious metal, but these parties have not been as successful as was expected. The Oregon men seem to be the luckless diggers on these branches.

The old-fashioned rocker is the only and the simplest way yet invented to separate the dirt from the one. In future years quicksi ver will doubtless be used, but gold is yet to o plenty and too easily procured to need the aid of amaigams.

The mornings and evenings are cool and delightful, the middle of the day hot and dry. when the themometer ranges from 90 to 115 Farenbeit. Upon the Sacremento and is tribut ries, are at work about 15,000 men and with the year ending next January, they will doubtless relieve the earth of little less than \$20,000,000, and this we consider a moderate estimate.

The San Jo quan divides with the Sacra mento the gold-seeking population, where though wrought and re wrought, the quantity still remains unabated.

The Stanislaus shores has afforded the largest specimens, varying from balf an ounce to 15 pounds, and thousands are now waiting the low water to excavate the virgin bars of this wealthy river.

The dry diggings on Wood's Creek have yielded thousands of ounces; and the Mexicars located at the Soucranian camp have reaped a rich hervest; these diggings are hearly deserted for a lack of water to wash the gold While on the Stanislaus, the shores are filled with springs, and pumps are necessary to keep the water out while dig-



RAISING OF CALVES .- The best method of raising calves, we think, is to do so by hand-If taken from the cow as soon as droppedthere will be no deficulty in teaching it to eat-Lobbbly, made of half a pint of corn meal and a pint of new milk, given to it about three times a day, will be sufficient to keep it. It is the easiest thing imaginable to teach the calf to suck up its food; by simply pressing its head into the pan containing the mixture, with one hand, and inserting the fore finger of the other into its mouth, it will instinctively suck up its beverage. If it is desirable to husband your milk, you may begin to decrease the quantity which you add to your lablolly, when the calf is about three weeks old, putting in less milk each day, until the calf imperceptibly forgets its taste altogether. its growth, continue its loblolly twice a day;
