The Deficiency Appropriation bill for Red Cloud Agency has passed the House.

HAVANA, March 10.—The entire tobacco crop in the Remedios district with rare exceptions, is lost.

Minister Schenck has resigned, and R. H. Dana, of Massachusetts, has been appointed in his place.

Marsh, Belknap's informer, is at the St. Lawrence Hotel, Montreal.

During January \$3,500,000 worth of postage stamps, postal cards, and stamped envelopes were sold.

Edwin Booth, the actor, has refused \$20,000 in gold, for twenty performances in San Francisco.

At Rochester, N. Y., the front building of the Rochester Brewing Company was burned Saturday. Loss \$30,000.

Wm. S. Robinson, a journalist of Boston whose letters over the signature of "Warrenton" were widely known, died Saturday aged 58.

The failure is reported of E. O. Tufts & Co., woolen commission merchants of Boston and No. 35 North street, N. Y. Their liabilities are said to be very heavy, being variously estimated at from \$250,000 to \$1,000,000.

New York bank statement: Loans increase half million; specie increase three-eighths million, legal tenders increase five-eighths million, deposits increase five-eighths million, reserve increase one million.

Green peas from Florida sell in New York at \$4.50 @ \$5 per crate and cucumbers at \$5 to \$6 per dozen. Strawberries bring from four to five dollars a quart.

A strike occurred among the employees of the New York, Bay Ridge & Jamaica Railroad Company, at Bay Ridge, Long Island, Saturday. The contractor had kept back from each man ten day's wages. The police were called upon to prevent breaches of the peace.

Mr. Caulfield, chairman of the committee on the Departments, is quoted as saying that he has information that will form the basis of one of the largest investigations of the season. The War, Postoffice, Justice and Interior Departments are all involved. Mr. Caulfield has had a consultation with the chairman of the committee on Expenditures of these Departments, lasting two hours. The investigation will be joint of the four committees.

The United States marshals have in the last few days arrested a number of citizens of Jefferson and Blount counties, Ala., on a charge of acts committed six years ago. The men arrested have not been away from their homes during the past six years, but the officials refused to take bail, and hurried them off to Huntsville. It is supposed this is the renewal of the plan pursued in 1874, when there was a State election. The election this year comes off in August.

The band of the Fifth Michigan Volunteers serenaded Lincoln. The cornet player, Henry Kerns, was very fat, and the President remarked, "You are the biggest blower I ever saw." The anecdote is revived by the suicide of Kerns, in Detroit, in consequence of the obesity which gave rise to Lincoln's joke. Of late years he grew larger steadily, and at last became too fat to blow a cornet. Lack of employment made him despondent, and he cut his throat.

Two factions of Chinamen have often fought in Virginia City, Nevada, a recent encounter resulting in the death of two and the wounding of others. A formal agreement of peace has now been signed by Sam Sing and Hop Sing, the opposing leaders. This was brought about by a Grand Jury, the foreman of which, in a speech, told them that their shooting endangered other citizens, and that they would be driven out of the city unless they behaved themselves.

Out of 100 criminal cases tried at the Mecklenburg superior court, all were convicted but two.

We learn by a dispatch to a Richmond paper of a singular accident that took place on the 9th ult., near King's Mountain Samuel Harman, a carpenter, was standing on a scaffold repairing a dwelling. The scaffold fell, and a chisel which he had in his hand during the fall, cut his windpipe and jugular veins killing him instantly.
