The Speaking Last Night.

Stanly Hall was almost packed to its utmost capacity last night with white and colored citizens to hear Hon. C. R. Thomas' speech, which was announced in yesterday's NUT SHELL. Mr. Thomas commenced by stating: "I was met on the street a few days since by a friend who remarked to me that he was pleased to learn I had changed my politics. I told him, no! I had not changed my politics, but should cast my vote for the Electors who represent Tilden and Hendricks in the National election, and should vote the State ticket headed by Vance and Jarvis." The Judge spoke for more than an hour, and was greeted with much applause. After the conclusion of Mr. Thomas' speech, some little wrangling was indulged in by the two parties assembled—the Republicans desiring to hear a speech from L. J. Moore, Esq., and the Democrats objecting on the ground that the meeting was only called to hear Mr. Thomas' speech. Some very rough language was used and angry demonstrations made, but a few conciliatory remarks from Maj. John Hughes and Sheriff Hubbs, calmed the troubled waters, when the meeting adjourned. After which L. J. Moore, Esq., was called to the floor by a large number of Republicans who remained in the hall. Mr. Moore responded to the call and addressed them in quite a lengthy speech, after which Sheriff Hubbs, being called on, made a few remarks, which ended the night's campaign gun.

Before the Mayor.

The white and colored man whom we announced as having fought near the market Wednesday evening, were arraigned before his Honor Mayor Wolfenden yesterday and fined \$1 each and costs. Owen Kinsey, a negro man, was up charged with fighting. The evidence went to show that Kinsey had got terribly on his muscle—that he was actually spilling for a fight, so much so that after wildly cavorting around for some time, offering almost any inducement to get some one to let him knock them into next week, he pounced on a little, weakly-looking, Quaker-disposed colored boy and gave him a specimen of his thraashativeness. The Mayor thought the fiddler ought to be paid well for that kind of dancing, and fined Kinsey \$10, or 30 days in jail, with hard labor on the streets.

Prisoner Escaped.

Yesterday evening the policeman on duty at the Station House had occasion to step to the front door of the building for a moment, on business, when Owen Kinsey, the man of war spoken of in another item, took advantage of the occasion and slipped out of the window, fleeing up the street at a break-neck gate, and making good his escape. No blame can be attached to the policeman, as it was not thought necessary to confine the negro in a cell, and no idea was entertained that he was so anxious to escape as to risk breaking his neck getting out of the window or being shot down in his flight.

Tax Payers, take Notice.

In accordance with the following paragraphs, extracted from an Ordinance adopted by the Board of Aldermen, I hereby give notice to the tax payers of Newbern that I will be in attendance at the City Clerk's office on and after Aug. 28th, from 9 to 12 o'clock A. M., and from 3 to 5 o'clock P. M. As the law prescribes a certain manner of collecting taxes which cannot be avoided, I would advise all persons owing taxes to come forward and settle the same without delay.

"All citizens engaged in or practicing any of the occupations, trades or professions herein specified and taxed and who may propose to continue in the same, shall call on the Collector at his office within the First Ten Days of the month and obtain Licenses for the same.

"Any person who shall control or commence a business, trade or profession as herein specified, and shall neglect to obtain License for the same, as herein ordained shall pay a double tax for said neglect.

"And it is further Ordained that all ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting herewith, be and the same are hereby repealed."
